

THE WAR IS OVER.

With simplicity in keeping with re publican institutions, the war which has raged between Spain and the San Francisco United States for a period of three months and twenty-two days was quietly terminated at twenty-three minutes past 4 o'clock Friday afternoon, when Secretary Day, for the flag on every island we think best to United States, and M. Camdon, for Spain, in the presence of President McKinley, signed a protocol which will form the basis of a definite treaty

THE PROTOCOL.

1. Spain will relinquish all claim

2 Porto Rico and other Spanish Islands in the West Indies and an islby the United States, shall be ceded to the latter.

3. The United States will occupy and hold the city, bay and barbor of ment of the Philippines.

4. Cuba, Porto Rico and other Spanish islands in the West Indies shall be immediately evacuated and that commissioners, to be appointed days from the sighing of the protocol the details of the evacuation.

5. The United States and Spain will each appoint not more than five commissioners to negotiate and conclude a treaty of peace. The comlater than the first of October.

6. On the signing of the protocol, hostilities will be suspended and notice to that effect will be given as soon as possible by each government to the commanders of its military and naval forces.
