It is often brought up as an argument in favor of a cut on the school appropriation that Pennsylvania appropriates more than double as much for this purpose than most every other State, and almost doubly as much as the great State of New York. True enough. But if our legislature will give us the same privilege enjoyed by that State of allowing corporations to be taxed locally for school and other purposes, then we could favor a cut in the common school appropriation, and a big one, too, and still come out away ahead. Until that is done there must be no cut on this magnificent appropriation.
