"Loud applause greeted the earnest pereration of a speech made by Representative Towler in the House to-day after he had exposed the evils of the sweatshop system in this State. The bill under consideration was one prepared by the Factory Inspectors' Department, and was an amendment to the anti-sweatshop act of 1897. "It gives the factory inspectors the right to confiscate goods made in places where unsanitary conditions and uncleanliness exist, and is aimed at the tenement sweatshops in Philadelphia.

"Mr. Towler was the only one to speak on the bill, and he charged that the horrible conditions that exist where clothing is made in Philadelphia are directly traceable to the men who get the contracts for clothing and then sublet them to the poor at prices that are almost incredible. Suddenly in the midst of his speech he drew from his desk a pair of men's trousers.

"The retail price of this pair of trousers, he said, 'ls \$3.50. The man who made them got 25 cents. One man can make three pairs a day. Here,' and he held up another garment, 'is a summer coat which retails at 50 cents. 


