THE exports of the calendar year 1899 are likely to be the largest in our history in spite of the doleful predictions made as to the prospective effect of the Dingley law upon our foreign markets.

BILLY MASON looks forward anxiously to the day when the flag in Cuba is to come down. Flag furling has become the master passion with Billy, but he is not likely to witness much of it in this country.

THE money in the country has increased nearly 33 per cent. in the three years since Mr. Bryan and his followers were trying to make us believe that only free coinage could cause an increase in our currency.

REPUBLICANS will be in full control of the government for the next year and a half. Their legislation on trusts will be wise and effective, but it will not include the destruction of the protective tariff as Democrats advise.

MR. McLEAKA'S remedy for trusts is to limit their profit-making capacity to 5 per cent. on the capital, but he forgets to limit the extent of capitalization. Trusts that water \$5,000,000 in cash into \$100,000,000 in stock would be satisfied with 5 per cent.

THE very eminent gentlemen who say that they favor the expansion of trade but not the expansion of territory are singularly suggestive of the man who was "fur" the law but "agin" its enforcement. It is barely possible that they do not see the force of this saying, but the force is there nevertheless. - Phila. Inquirer.

WHAT has become of the gallant Colonel from Nebraska? Can it be possible that he has been silenced at last? How notable are the affairs of men. The most talkative man of the country has at last lapsed into silence; his voice drowned in the acclamations of a grateful country to the hero of the age, Admiral Dewey. The debt we owe to Dewey is thus doubled.

THE Bryan element in Massachusetts has succeeded in naming a Bryan and free silver delegation for the Democratic National Convention, and in doing so alienated enough Democrats and Independents to assure Republican success in that State. Two or more of the men nominated on the State ticket by the Bryan convention have indignantly refused to run on the free silver platform enunciated.

FROM Harrisburg it is learned that for the first time since the fire which destroyed the capitol building all the departments of the State Government are on Capitol Hill. The last to return was the Department of Public Instruction, which had occupied rented rooms at Second and Locust streets. The State Forestry Commissioner, the Economic Zoologist, and others, who were compelled to seek quarters in different parts of the city, have gradually returned to the first floor of the new State House, which is adapted for the uses of these departments. It is probable that the next Legislature will provide for the completion of the building by making a suitable appropriation.

IN a recent interview in Chicago, Robt. E. Patterson, twice elected governor of Pennsylvania by the Democratic party, comes out squarely in support of the President's Philippine policy, as declared in his Pittsburg speech. "As the Philippine islands are ours," said he, "we are bound to see them pacified, to set up law and order in their midst. This is our first duty; it is a national duty, and Democrats and Republicans alike are bound to fulfill it. We cannot withdraw. Withdrawal would wound our honor and would invite the invasion of other nations into the affairs of those lands." There is little difference of opinion upon the necessity of suppressing the insurrection in the Philippines. If all Democrats who hold similar views would express them as candidly as Mr. Patterson, the task confronting our forces in the Orient would be greatly simplified. Aguinaldo makes no secret of the fact that the support of the anti-expansionists in America constitutes his main reliance and inspiration. That withdrawn, the rebellion would speedily collapse of its own weight.

the Dingley tariff law this fall. They claimed that it would result disastrously to our foreign commerce, would be a failure as a revenue producer, and that labor would not be benefited by it. Yet exports have steadily increased, the custom revenues are running higher than at any time under the Wilson tariff, and every man in the country who wants work can get it at advanced wages.

GOVERNOR STONE has appointed J. Hay Brown of Lancaster to the vacancy on the supreme court bench created by the death of Judge Henry W. Williams of Wellsboro last winter. Mr. Brown will take his seat when the court convenes at Pittsburg this month. He is the Republican nominee for supreme court judge to be voted for in November. Judge S. Leslie Mestrezat of Uniontown is the Democratic candidate. By reason of two vacancies existing on the bench and no elector being entitled to vote for more than one person, both candidates are certain of election.

ACCORDING to a New York Democratic paper, the "St. Louis trust conference was a failure." Of course, it was a failure if the object was to contribute anything of importance to the literature of the true question. But there was no such object. Perhaps Gov. Sayers, of Texas, who was the author of the project, had a sincere desire to do something toward the elucidation of the trust question, but his associates, with scarcely an exception, had no such idea. They wanted to have a gathering of cheap Democratic politicians held under conditions which would secure for them some attention throughout the country. It was a round-up of Democratic and Populist feather-heads, who could not get any notice from the press of the country if they met under any other auspices. In that view of the case the conference may or may not have been a failure. - Globe Democrat.

IN the course of his speech at Akron, O., Saturday, Governor Roosevelt said: "Aguinaldo, who has turned against us, owed his return to the Islands to us. It was not the Filipinos who conquered the Spaniards, and as a consequence it was to us the Islands fell, and we shall show ourselves not merely weaklings unfit to take our place among the great nations of the world, but traitors to the cause of the advancement of mankind, if we flinch from doing aright the task which destiny has entrusted to our hands. We have no more right to leave the Filipinos to butcher one another and sink slowly back into savagery, than we would have the right, in an excess of sentimentality, to declare the Sioux and Apaches free to expell all white settlers from the lands they once held. The Filipinos offer excellent material for the future; with our aid they may be brought up to the level of self-government; but at present they cannot stand alone for any length of time."

The Philippine Question.

There are only two sides to the Philippine question—the side of the American flag and President McKinley, and the side of Aguinaldo. No reasonable man believes that the subjugation by the United States of the Philippine Islands means the enslavement or degradation of that people. There is no higher standard of human rights than was held by the people of this country, and the genius of our institutions is not calculated to degrade, but to elevate and ennoble all who come under its influence. He is not a sincere American who does not believe that the stars and stripes will prove a blessing to any country over which they float. After the insurrection in the Philippines is put down, Congress will provide a government for the inhabitants in harmony with our own institutions. That will mean liberty, enlightenment, prosperity and progress for them, and increase of prosperity for us; and the American who advocates the lowering of the flag in the Philippines is not only a traitor to his country, but an enemy to human progress and enlightenment. - Punzy Spirit.

The Fighting Nebraska Chaplain.

CONSPICUOUS among the speakers at the Republican State Convention of Nebraska was the Reverend Mr. Mailley, the chaplain of the First Regiment from that State. It is hinted that the leaders in the convention hesitated to put him up to speak, for he had previously been known as an independent in politics, but there was no cause for their hesitation. Standing before that enthusiastic assemblage, he frankly admitted that he had never voted the full Republican ticket in his life. "I have," he said, "voted against the sentiment of whole communities, and in time of peace have often been opposed to the administration, but the old flag was fired on and after that I followed the First Nebraska over the rice fields of Luzon, and shot the best I could. Now I have come home to vote and work the way I shot."

The Bryanite newspapers have sought to discount the value of these words by intimating that their sentiment was not new, but it is not on record that Mr. Mailley gave them out as new. He simply intended to tell the truth. Impelled to volunteer with the regiment which added so much to Nebraska's glory as a State, he found reason on the field to shoot as he best could. This reason he has given in a subsequent remark. The American soldiers had gone to the Philippines to "civilize and save" the natives (those are his own words), and were rewarded by Aguinaldo's forces with blade and bullets. In the knowledge of that fact the chaplain forgot that he was there as a spiritual adviser of the troops and "shot as best he could."

Because of these facts the attempts to ridicule him have fallen wide of the mark. There is little censure attaching to any American who resents an outrage on the American flag. - Phila. Inquirer.

Unless something unforeseen occurs, Walter Wheaton, who was tried for the murder of George Carter in this court last November, convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced to a term of 104 years in the penitentiary, will be compelled to serve his long sentence. Gillespie & Pettit, of Greenville, counsel for Wheaton, took an appeal from the decision of Judge Criswell refusing the defendant a new trial, and the case was to have been considered by the Supreme Court at the session which begins in Pittsburg on Oct. 9th. This appeal, however, has been abandoned. The testimony, which was written from the notes of the court stenographer, L. F. Haney, at a cost of over \$300, was never lifted from the records. That the case should thus terminate is not surprising to anyone conversant with its history, and Wheaton should consider himself lucky to escape with his life. - Franklin News.
