

Result in Forest County

By the table of official election figures published in this issue it will be observed that Forest county maintains its solid Republican front if we did slip a cog on one of our candidates for county commissioner. The total vote cast was 1,568. Of this amount Col. Barnett received 852, Creasy 292, and Caldwell 69, leaving a Republican majority of 270 on a vote that is considered a light one even in an off year. The flood in the Allegheny and Clarion rivers came just right to take away a large percentage of voters, a great majority of whom were Republicans. But for this fact the majority would have been considerably over 500. The vote on the Sheriff was uncomforably close. Mr. Jamieson ran well in and carried all the townships except two—his vote leading the State ticket in a number of precincts. At one time it looked as if he were beaten but the final count put him nine ahead of his competitor. Close, but enough to elect just the same.

THE G. O. P. keeps on the even tenor of its way in spite of off years.

AQUINALDO will listen in vain for the rumble of the November tidal wave he hoped for.

Iowa's Republicanism is as steadfast as the State is intelligent and thriving, which is to say that it has no superior Majority over 60,000.

EDWARD ATKINSON will have to do some close figuring to find the anti-expansion vote in his State. Republican majority about 65,000.

NEW JERSEY was the last of the Northern States to become Republican, but it swings along steadily in the orbit of good politics. Majority over 20,000.

PENNSYLVANIA furnished over 20,000 men for the Spanish and Philippine war, making her total more than any other State or Territory in the Union.

GEN. JOUBERT, commander-in-chief of the Boer army, is a native of Pennsylvania. He was born in Fayette county, and went to South Africa when a young man. A sister of his wife is a resident of Pittsburgh.

Not a few are of the opinion that the natural resentment felt by the people of Maryland over the treatment accorded Admiral Schley was one of the causes which led to the Republican reverses in that State at the recent election.—Blizzard, Ochl!

BRYAN claims the result in Ohio was not an endorsement of the administration, because the combined vote of McLean and Jones exceeded that of Nash. The Nebraska man can crawl out of a small hole when it becomes necessary to do so.—Oil City Blizzard.

THERE seems to be some doubt whether Mr. Bryan will be in great demand as a campaign orator in 1900, in view of the fact that the Republicans polled an unexpectedly large vote and gained substantial victories in every State in which he made speeches in the recent campaign, excepting in Nebraska, where a fusion of populism and fat-money Democracy was successful.

THE vote in Pennsylvania is best calculated from that cast for the two candidates for Supreme Judge on which there was no contest, and therefore no excuse for cutting by either faction. That for Brown, Rep., was 490,932, and Mestrezat, Dem., 300,896, leaving a majority for the Republicans of 190,036. This majority is more likely to be increased than diminished by the official count.

CUSTOMS receipts under the Dingley law continue to surpass the most sanguine expectations of its friends. In the month of October they amounted to \$18,800,000, or an average of over \$600,000 per day, and in the first nine days of November were over \$6,000,000, thus being far in excess of the half a million dollars a day which is the amount ordinarily expected of the customs and of the revenue-producing machinery of the Government.

ANOTHER feather in the cap of the administration is the acquisition of the island of Tutuila in the Samoan group, which falls to our lot in the readjustment made by the United States, Germany and Great Britain. This island possesses the finest harbor in the south Pacific, and perhaps the entire Pacific Ocean, and thus adds a very valuable future to the Pacific territory which has come into the possession of the United States during President McKinley's term.

THE unanimous opinion of Admiral Dewey and his associates on the Philippine commission that the government should retain possession of the Philippine Islands doubtless had its effect upon the minds of many voters who were undetermined as to the wisdom of our expansion policy, and whose decision in support of the president gave in the recent election the unexpectedly large Republican majorities in Ohio, Kentucky, New York, New Jersey, Iowa, Pennsylvania and other States.

THE venom of the anti-expansionists toward the President is doubtless much increased by the perception that he judged rightly what the people wanted. Men who berate him started with the idea that he had caught a breeze of popular favor which would lift them from the dust heap of things forgotten. Most of them had found President McKinley a very objectionable man because he had achieved victory as a protectionist when they met defeat as free traders. It is curious how many of these anti-expansionists are merely free traders, hunting for an opportunity to attack with success the protectionist whose tariff bill made him President.—Tribune.
