tion One. Add at the end of the first paragraph of said section, after the words "shall be en-titled to vote at all elections," the words 'subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may exact. so that the said section shall read as fol-

Section 1. Qualifications of Electors. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifiesage, possessing the following quarters-tions, shall be entitled to vote at all elec-tions, subject however to such laws re-quiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may

He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

He shall have resided in the State one year (or if having previously been a quali-field elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed increfrom and returned, within six mentls, immediately preceding the election).

He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least

two months immediately preceding the election. If twenty two years of age and apwards he shall have paid within two years as State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the elec-
