PATRICK TRIAL

Lawyer Engaged as Defendant's Coun sel Testifies.

bert T. Patrick for causing the death made public yesterday. of W. M. Rice was resumed after a lapse of six days, caused by the illness of a Juror

The most interesting part of the trial was the move of the state in placing in the witness box John R. Potts, a lawyer and banker, and at one time at least a friend of the acthings, that Patrick, a few days before his arrest, but after Mr. Rice's death, had retained him as counsel,

and that the tie had not been severed. Mr. House of counsel for defense objected strongly to the testimony being accepted by the court on the ground that Mr. Potts' conversations with Patrick were privileged.

The court, however, allowed Mr. Potts to testify to matters prior to Patrick's arrest.

The witness swore he had known Patrick since 1870, becoming intimate with him in 1800. He had never seen Mr. Rice in Patrick's office though the latter was in the same suite as his (Potts'). Patrick had told him a rich client had died and made him residpary legatee. Patrick had also shown him many of the documents now in dispute among them the "Patrick" will, and he had told Patrick he did not think the will would hold. Patrick replied "that's all right, the essete is practically mine." Mr. Potts also advised Patrick not to fill out and use the blank checks purported to have been given him by Mr. Rice and Patrick replied he would use the money as Mr. Rice had named him as residuary legatee because of his per sonal regard for him. He also told witness the day before Mr. Rice died taht he had not seen him for a week. Then Mr. Potts swore that the day after the death Patrick had brought him a check for \$25,000 and asked

him to get it certified. This he had done, as he did with other checks. The defense confined itself to asking Mr. Petts if Patrick had told him he was to receive the estate as trustee and the answer was that he had.

OFFICIAL ASSASSINATED.

Bulgarian Minister of Instruction

Sofia, Bulgaria, Feb. 7.-M. Kamtcheft, the minister of public instruction, was assassinated in his study by a Macedonian who pretended he wanted to present a petition.

The assassin subsequently commit ted suicide by shooting himself. M. Kamtcheff's assassin, who had been a student at the university of Sofia, was appointed to a professor ship in a provincial town. pointed at not being assigned to a position at the capital he had threatened to murder M. Kamtcheff. The police knew of the man's threats and were also aware that there were doubts as to his sanity, but they allowed him to secure a private audience of M. Kamtcheff and the minis-

ter's murder followed.


