### LUKE DILLON OR KARL DALLMAN

Was Believed by his Friends to Be With the Boers.

Philadelphia, March 29.—Luke Dillon, who it is said was sentenced under the name of Karl Dallman to life imprisonment for the Welland canal dynamite outrage, was well known in this city as a member of various Irish-American organizations, including the Clan-na-Gael, the Irish-American club and the Ancient Order of Hibernians. He was also a member of the Redmen. He had been teller of the Dime Savings bank in this city, but resigned that position two years ago. It is said by several of his friends that he joined a party of his countrymen who left here early in 1909 to go to South Africa with about 50 Irish residents of Chicago for the purpose of joining the Boer army.

Luke J. Dillon, his son, occupies a clerical position in the postoffice here. He declined to discuss the published statement of his father's alleged identification further than to say he did not credit the report. He would not say how long his father had been absent from the city.

### MINER LOST HIS WAY.

James Hefferman Rescued After Many Hours of Agony.

Pittston, Pa., March 29.—James Hefferman, one of the oldest and most experienced miners in this district, went into some of the old workings of the Gaylord mine on Wednesday last and when he attempted to make his way out, again was lost. He wandered around the honeycombed caverns a mile away from the surface and when his supplies were nearly exhausted and he lay down in the darkness to await his fate.

When he did not return home a searching party was formed and Thursday night he was found more dead than alive. He had wandered through the subterranean chambers for more than a mile from where he was engaged at work.

### Lozes Hope and Dies.

New Castle, Pa., March 29.—Flumer S. Allen of Neshannock avenue died at the Shenango Valley hospital under peculiar circumstances. He had been ill for a year and went to that institution to undergo an operation. When under the anesthetic it was found that the operation would not avail to save his life and it was not attempted. When Allen recovered he asked if he had been operated upon and the doctors replied that he had not, as it would be no use. Allen had met disease bravely, but this statement seemed to break his heart and he dropped dead back on the operating table. He was 24 years old and was born at Prospect, Butler county.

### Threatened to Kill His Wife.

William Hays, Pa., March 29.—John Spoel, an Italian, was arrested at Hazleton for being frightened from the New York train. He came from Italy, and word was received in advance that he had sworn to kill his wife. She got a letter which came only on a faster

### boat than her husband took and notified the police. They are holding Spoel until they hear from the commissioner of immigration, asking what to do with him. Five years ago, in Italy, Spoel tried to kill his wife. She then left him and came to this country and since he has been trying to find her.

### Red Bank Station Burned.

Red Bank, Pa., March 29.—A fire which broke out at this place at 3:30 Thursday afternoon completely destroyed the Allegheny Valley railroad station, the railroad restaurant, conducted by Mrs. Carr, and all the contents of both buildings. The loss will reach from \$10,000 to \$12,000, partially covered by insurance. Word was sent to the Verona shops and two box cars were being hauled. One box car will be the ticket office, while the other will be used as a baggage room.

### To Change River's Channel.

New Castle, Pa., March 29.—Within a week work will commence on moving the Shenango river at Harbor Bridge, Lawrence county. The channel of the stream is to be changed to permit the construction of tracks for the Pennsylvania Railroad Co., which is engaged in double-tracking the Erie and Pittsburg branch from this city to Erie.

### Fight Telephone Company.

Johnstown, Pa., March 29.—At a meeting of 100 subscribers of the Johnstown Telephone company Wednesday night, called to discuss ways and means of evading the raised rates, a committee of 10 was appointed with Frank A. Creswell chairman, to advertise for bids for 800 phones for a stated length of time on contract.

### Washboards Follow the Flag.

Beaver Falls, Pa., March 29.—The Ingram Richardson Manufacturing company of this place has received an order from a Western firm for 100,000 dozen enameled iron washboards. It is said the greater part of this big order will be shipped to the Philippines.

### Two School Houses Burned.

Greensburg, Pa., March 29.—Two schoolhouses in South Shenango township, eight miles from here, were destroyed by fire simultaneously. It is thought it was of incendiary origin.
