



A JOINT RESOLUTION

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an amendment to the Constitu-tion of the Commonwealth. Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Com-monwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following is pro-posed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Common wealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eight-menth article thereof:
