Letter to G. W. Robinson. Tionesta, Pa. Dear Sir: You own several houses. Your reason for painting Devoe lead and zinc should be several times as strong as the man who owns but one. Lead and oil was good enough paint till the merits of zinc were found out. The addition of zinc to lead makes Devoe lead and zinc last twice as long and cost no more; costs less—a trifle less not much. Lead and oil is mixed by hand; Devoe lead and zinc by machinery. Might as well make one's shirts by hand as mix paints. Say it costs \$100 a house to paint lead and oil; and it lasts three years. Say it costs the same for Devoe; which lasts six years—it will last ten years in favorable conditions, unless you want to repaint to change the color.
