Will Be Used Far Improvements of

the Main Line. Philadelphia, Jan. 26. - The Pennsylvania railroad's \$35,000,000 loan is a bit of temporary financing only, pending the authorization of the increase ir capital to be asked of the stockhold ers in March.

It will be devoted toward improve ments on the Pennsylvania lines east and west of Pittsburg. It was rendered imperative by the present great freight blockade and will be used to destroy and prevent such jams in the

First Vice President Green made a statement in which it is set forth that the money is for immediate use in car rying on the construction work under way and planned on its lines, on each side of Pittsburg.

"In making the financial arrange ments referred to," Mr. Green said, "the Pennsylvania Railroad company is temporari'y financing for the construction work necessary to be prosecuted at once east and west of Pittsburg, in order to relieve the present congestion of traffic upon its lines, and pro vide additional yards, second, third and fourth tracks, and other facilities absolutely necessary in order to bring about Pittsburg, Pa. a free movement of its traffic."

This work is scattered over various lines in its system, both east and west counties shaving shingles, Ben Yohe was of Pittsburg. Among the important pleces of work east of Pittsburg are the new line from Marysville above Harrisburg to Atglen; the new line across West Philadelphia to Greenwich; the Brilliant line at Pittsburg; the construction of third and fourth tracks at various points on the Middle and Pittsburg divisions and the new line which brings into use the Portage road over the mountains between Cresson and Huntingdon; the elevation of tracks on the Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington in Chester and Wilmington; the reconstruction of its line in Washington and the construction of a union station at that point.

Favor Higher Tariff. New Castle, Pa., Jan. 24.-Councils are considering the matter of making reprisals against industrial corporations which do not operate their local works, by raising the tax levied on them. The American Steel and Wire company is one syndicate against which this action may especially be directed. The New Castle nail, wire and rod mills have been idle practically ever since they were sold to the trust. The taxes here are very low on manufacturing plants, in order to induce the erection of manufacturing enterprises, but councils advocate putting up the tariff on those which never run.
