To the Republican Electors of Penn'a.

I am directed by the Republican State Committee to announce that the Republicans of Pennsylvania, by their duly chosen representatives, will meet in convention at the opera house in the city of Harrisburg, on Wednesday, May 27th, 1903, at 10:30 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices, to-wit:

One person for the office of State Treasurer. One person for the office of Auditor General. Two persons for the office of Judge of the Superior Court. In accordance with the rules governing the organization, the representation in the State Convention will be based on the vote polled at the last Presidential election. Under the rules each legislative district is entitled to one delegate for every two thousand votes cast for the Presidential Electors in 1900, and an additional delegate for every fraction of two thousand votes polled in excess of one thousand.

Republican County Committee Meeting.

A meeting of the Republican County Committee of Forest county will be held in the rooms of Republican headquarters in Tionesta, Thursday evening, March 19, 1903, at 7:30 o'clock. All members of the Committee are requested to be present at this meeting as business of importance to the party in the county will come up. Among other things the fixing of a date for holding the Republican Primary Election will be decided.

A new canard, that the Agricultural Department at Washington is trying to produce a breed of featherless fowls is going the rounds of the press. There is no truth in it, it is needless to say.

MANY leaders of the Republican party are opposed to tariff revision. They believe it would prove inimical to the interests of the country, would destroy prosperity and precipitate hard times.

THE Republican members of Congress are generally satisfied with the anti-trust legislation enacted and so is the President. If it is demonstrated that more is necessary, there will be further action.

EX-JUDGE HENDERSON, of Meadville, was on Monday appointed Judge of the Superior Court to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge Porter. Governor Pennypacker had decided on this choice several days ago. The appointment gives very general satisfaction in the western part of the State.

On Wednesday United States Senator John P. Jones, of Nevada retired to private life after a continuous service of thirty years in the Senate. This equals the service of the famous Thomas H. Benton of Missouri, who served five consecutive terms. Only two men have served more than thirty years in the upper house of Congress. They were John Sherman, of Ohio, and Justin Morrill, of Vermont, who served thirty-two years. Only one of the senators who began his career with Senator Jones in 1873, has continued in service since. The exception is Senator Allison, of Iowa, who on Wednesday entered upon his sixth term, and being still in good health gives promise of rounding out thirty-six which would break the record.

KILLED BY RUNAWAY ENGINE.

Sharon, Pa., March 9.—In the face of death Clinton Yoder, aged 25 years, tried to stop a runaway stationary engine in the machine shop of the United States Steel corporation at South Sharon and was instantly killed. A dozen machinists in the plant had narrow escapes.

Something went wrong with the engine and the flywheel began running at a tremendous rate of speed. Yoder rushed to the steam valve to shut off the steam. Just when he reached the engine the flywheel, which was five feet in diameter, burst, throwing large pieces of metal in all directions. It is thought he was struck on the head by the belt, which flew off the wheel when it burst. His skull was crushed and he died instantly.

A hole several feet in diameter was torn in the brick wall by a portion of the wheel and one piece of metal was found several hundred yards from the shop. Other damage resulted.

Injured by Gas Explosion.

York, Pa., March 9.—The explosion of gas generated by the lamp of a soldering pot wrecked the kitchen at the home of Mrs. John H. Small, in this city, and severely burned Edward Herkert, a plumber, who was repairing a water pipe. While the plumber worked he failed to observe that the door and windows of the apartment were tightly closed, and there was a dense accumulation of gas in the room when the explosion, which was terrific, occurred. The woodwork of the kitchen was soon in flames, which a fire company was called out to extinguish. Herkert's condition is serious.

Miners Forbidden to Talk.

Charleston, W. V., March 9.—The federal authorities have made the remarkable ruling that the prisoners arrested the day of the Stanfords City "battle" are not to be allowed to talk to newspaper reporters. The ruling is additionally remarkable because of the fact that the men who shot down their companions are allowed to give their version of the affair. Public sentiment is fast supporting the facts brought out at the coroner's verdict, and the federal officers are being sharply criticized for suppressing the arrested miners.

Coke Trade Improving.

Connellsville, Pa., March 9.—Of the coke trade of Connellsville and the lower Connellsville region the Courier says: The condition of the coke market is improving. Rather the railroads are making a determined effort to better their service. The limited movement of cars has been accomplished with less difficulty during the past week than during February. Partly responsible for this has been the mild weather or conditions, always a factor in coke shipments, and the supply of empties furnished the operators.

Ferry Boat Sunk.

Pittsburg, March 9.—The ferry boat Neptune, plying between Allegheny and the West End, was sunk in the Ohio river by the steamer Margaret Saturday. Passengers and crew had to swim to the Allegheny side in order to save their lives. The Neptune was crossing the river from the West End and carried 80 passengers, workmen on their way to the mills in Lower Allegheny. Immediately after the collision the ship filled and sank.
