American Municipal Government.

Much as has been said about the rottenness of municipal governments, the truth seems to be that badly governed cities and towns are the exception and not the rule in this country. The fact that several of our leading cities have been badly governed—New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Chicago—has somehow created a widespread belief that municipal government in general is bad. The truth is, however, that most of our cities are governed with rigid economy and on excellent business principles. Buffalo, for instance, is an example of a well governed city. It is a notorious fact that public improvements are made in that city cheaper than private citizens can get the same class of work done, and the affairs of the municipality are conducted in a manner that meets the approval of the most exacting resident. The same can be said of the great majority of American towns and cities. A few organized gangs of grafters have turned our cities into sink-holes of municipal corruption, and we have been too eager to assume that they are all alike. The best way to stamp out public virtue and integrity is to assume they do not exist. Praise, where deserved, is a duty, just as much as condemnation of a known wrong is a duty. Wholesale denunciation is as unwise as it is unjust, because it creates the impression that, no matter how deserving, public servants will receive no credit, and will be classed with the wicked and profligate. The greatest stimulus to both public and private virtue is proper recognition. —Punxsutawney Spirit.

How Lynching Can be Avoided.

Lynchings in England are unheard of. No one ever thinks such lawlessness possible over there. Nor is it, and there is very good reason for it. Justice, swift and sure follows upon the heels of a crime. The people know this. They have every confidence that there will be no failure of the courts, and they are content to await judicial movements, which are always rapid. Four years ago a man killed a woman and buried her in a trench on the premises of the house where the young couple had lived. On the 27th of last April the body was discovered and identified. This case is known as the "Moat House Murder." Quick work was done. The proper person was arrested, tried and convicted. He was hanged the other day, three weeks after sentence had been passed upon him. That is the way they do things in England, and that is the way we should do them here. Let us have swift justice and lynchings will gradually disappear. —Philadelphia Inquirer.

REPRESENTATIVE LANDIS has a new remedy for lynching. He would have every state legislature pass a law making the sheriff from whose custody a prisoner is taken, lose his position and become ineligible to any other. He would further make the county in which the outrage is committed liable to damages of from \$1,500 to \$2,500 to be forfeited to the heirs of the lynched.

Old Time Tipping.

Power of a Swan's Wing.
