IT IS REPORTED that Hobson will sue the Mikado of Japan for infringement, as he had taken out a patent on his failure, in corking harbors.

A SERVICE pension bill is being pushed strongly in Congress. It would provide pensions of \$12 a month. The Grand Army is vigorously behind it.

IT LOOKS NOW as if there would be fourteen or fifteen candidates voted for on the first ballot in the Democratic national convention. A good many States seem to have a favorite son.

THE PRESIDENT is in a hurry to begin work on the Panama canal, but the Republic of Colombia has sued the French Panama Canal Company and enjoined it against transferring the property.

MR. BRYAN is really chivalrous in discussing current events. He says, "Mr. Hearst is among those worthy to be mentioned." This is a concession about this that is delightful and that is no doubt appreciated.

SENATOR TILLMAN says that a farmer is a man who works with his hands and an agriculturist is a man who works with his mouth. If anybody ever knew Senator Tillman to work with his hands, he will please stand up and be counted.

THE PUNISHMENT of postal frauds ought to help the Republican party. Our postal department is the greatest organization in the world, having grown from 75 postoffices in Franklin's time, to 76,000 now, and from 300 employees to 250,000. The percentage of fraud is amazingly small.

THE PRESIDENT'S protest against race suicide seems to be effective. A Washington man named Winnebger, who weighs only 115 pounds is the father of four sets of twins and one set of quadruplets—twelve babies in all. The President will no doubt show him into the census office on a good salary.

THERE IS PROPERTY to the amount of \$283,965.84 free from taxation in the city of Washington—more religious property than all the school houses. A crusade has begun for the taxation of churches. Dr. Easton, Presbyterian, says, "We shall rejoice in being permitted to follow the example of our Lord, who paid his taxes like a gentleman."

EVERYBODY'S MAGAZINE calls aloud for a parcel-post and says its coming is only a question of a short time. Why should the American people be tyrannized over by four express companies which insist on monopolizing the carrying business? We ought to be able to send ten or twenty pounds by mail, as the Germans, English, French and many other people do.

Republican Primary Election.

Pursuant to decision of the Republican Chairmen of the Counties comprising the 28th Congressional District, and a resolution by the Republican Committee of Forest County, passed February 22, 1904, it is ordered that the Republican voters of Forest County meet on

SATURDAY, MARCH 19, 1904, at 1 o'clock, p. m., at the following named places of holding primary elections, to-wit:

Barnett-Clarrington, Cooksburg, Redcliffe.

Green-Nebraska, Gultonville, Golinza, Harmony-West Hickory, Fogle Farm, Hickory-East Hickory.

Howe-Brookston, Cooper Tract, Pigeon, Lynch, Porkey, Cloughs, Watson Farm.

Jenks-Marleville, Duhring, Lamona, Kingsley-Mayburg, Kellettsville, Newtown Mills, Starr.

Tionesta Township, Tionesta Borough.

At which time and places they will by their votes nominate:

One person for Congress.

One person for Associate Judge.

One person for County Treasurer.

One person for National Delegate.

One person for State Delegate.

Each election precinct will also elect one person for member of the County Committee for the ensuing year.

The polls will remain open till 7 p. m.

Return Judges will convene at the Court House, Tionesta Borough, on the following Tuesday, March 22, 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Attention is called to the Act of June, 1881, regulating primary elections, that Judges and Clerks, before entering upon the discharge of their duties, shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in presence of each other.

Attention is also directed to the following resolution adopted by the County Committee at its last meeting:

Resolved, That all Republicans be required to vote in their proper primary precincts, where such is possible, and in case the voter is unable to reach his proper voting place he shall, before voting, be obliged to have at least two Republican vouchers for his Republicanism and legal right to vote.

Proper election blanks and tickets will be mailed to the committeemen of the different precincts in due time. It is their duty to see that these are promptly on hand on the day of the primaries.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY RULES.

RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.

1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one or more of the county papers at least three weeks previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office and subject to the action of the party at the said primary meetings.

2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock p. m., and proceed to elect one person for Judge and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock p. m. After the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person being allowed to vote more than once for the same office.

3. After the polls are closed the board shall proceed to count the vote that each candidate has received, and make out the returns according to be certified by the Judge and attested by the Clerks.

4. The Judge (or one of the Clerks appointed by the Judge) of the respective election district shall meet at the Court House, in Tionesta, on the Tuesday following the Primary Meetings at 2 o'clock p. m., having the returns and a list of voters, and the person having the highest number of votes for any office, shall be declared the nominee of the Republican party.

5. The Return Judges shall be competent to reject by a majority the returns from any district where there is evidence of fraud, either in the returns or otherwise, and shall reject them where there is evidence of three or more persons voting at the Primary Meeting who are not Republicans.

6. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office the judges shall proceed to ballot for a choice, the person having the highest number to be the nominee.

7. The Return Judges shall appoint Conferees—Redeemative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointment shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes cast for that office.

8. The Return Judges may at any time change the mode and manner of selecting candidates as they may be instructed by the people at their primary meetings, due notice being given by the County Committee.

9. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be required to issue a call in pursuance of the action of the County Committee.
