

OUR FIRST HUNT CLUB.

It Was Organized in Pennsylvania

Away Back In 1766. The year 1766 is far back, but It is interesting to think that the mutterings of the comm. war storm were not yet so engrossing even then but that the sportsmen of Pennsylvania could turn their attention to a more systematle organization of their fox hunting forces and then established the first hunt club in the country, the Gloucester Hounds. Not that this was the beginning of the sport in Pennsylvania, that eminently horse loving country, for fox hunting had held a high place in the pastimes of the people many a year before. It was rather the evidenes that the sport had become so important that it needed systematizing, so that districts might be thoroughly hunted in turn and contentions, rivalry

and clashing dates be avoided. All the carly fox hunting clubs had their origin in the pre-existing ownership of a greater or less number of hounds by private owners. Every con-Siderable landowner in the south kept them, and good dogs they were, not niways orthodox, according to the standard of the Belveir and the Quorn. of today, but nevertheless bounds derived from the best English and European stock and continued by indicloss selection of those who showed the instincts by conformation suitable to the country in which they were called upon to work. Washington may be quoted as one of the southerners wells, bear bounds and hunted them too.

Lafayette, moreover, sent him from France a splendid pack of French foxhounds, with qualities which still further helped to complete the most perfeet animal for American fox hunting. the American hound.

PENSION RULING DISCUSSED.

Debate on Senator Carmack's Resolu-

tion Directing an Investigation. Washington, March 29.-The senate for three hours discussed the recent order of the pension bureau making old age an evidence of disability, and then passed the District of Columbia appropriation bill

The discussion of the pension order was based on the resolution offered some days ago by Mr. Carmack directing the committee on judiciary to inquire into the authority of the executive branch of the government for making such an order.

Mr. Carmack contended that no such authority exists, but several Republican senators argued the order was in line with the regulation issued by Judge Lochren, commissioner of pensions under Mr. Cleveland, fixing 65 years of age as an evidence of infirm-

They also declared that the new order would have only the effect of affording prima facie evidence of disability and not that of giving a pension solely because the age of 62 years had been reached by the pension applicant. Mr. Carmack later admitted 3160 that the first step taken fixing old age as evidence of disability had been taken by Mr. Cleveland.

The sundry civil bill was before the house but debate took a wide range. 3818 Mr. Gillett devoted considerable time 3818 to answering some of the statements recently made on the floor by Mr. Spight regarding the race question. Mr. Gillett declared he had supposed there were no social grades in the United States but that every man had the right to choose his own friends and associates among those most in sympathy with himself. He defend ed the president for inviting Booker Washington to dine with him.

Mr. Clark made a speech on the tar iff and declared unequivocally in favor of the tariff program for the Democratic party as outlined by Mr. Williams, the minority floor leader.

A strong plea for tobacco growers was made by Mr. Trimble, who urged 5192 the removal of the tax of 6 cents a pound on raw tobacco in order that the producer might sell direct to the con-

Mr. Trimble said, the negro was in a worse fix than when he was a slave. because then his master fed and 5192 1-6 of 150 " clothed him and cared for him in sickness, but today the tobacco trust had forced on him half rations and let him go hungry and half naked and had no compassion for him


