ANGLO-FRENCH TREATY.

Russian Ambassador at Paris Expressed His Government's Satisfaction at Outcome.

Paris, April 12.-The Russian ambassador, M. Nelidoff, acting on instructions from Foreign Minister Lamsdorff, has expressed the satisfaction of Russia at the conclusion of the Anglo-French colonial treaty. This is accepted as Russia's answer to the reports that the Anglo-French treaty was indirectly hostile to Russia.

In the course of an interview, M. friends and allies of France. As friends we rejoice at your successes. As allies we are gratified at this new guarantee of French strength and security. We naturally wish to see our ally as strong as possible and with the least possible international issues. Therefore, as the accord removes numerous vexations, it is most agreeable to Russia."

As indicating that the accord will have the effect of improving the relations between Russia and Great Britain the ambassador concluded with saying: "The old proverb-friends of 3160 our friends are our friends-may again be verified in this case."

RACE WAR IN TEXAS.

Over 100 Armed Men In Pursuit of Negro Who Killed Congressman Pinckeney's Brother.

Houston, Tex., April 12.-News from Walter county, 60 miles north of here, indicates that race feeling is very high, owing to the murder near Hempstead of Tucker Pinckeney, brother of Congressman John M. Pinckeney of the Houston district.

George Goss was with Pinckeney when he was killed. Goss says they were hunting cattle and rode to a negro church for a drink of water when they were fired on by the negroes, who were concealed behind the door. Seven revolver shots entered Pinckeney's body and death was instantaneous.

Goss said he had trouble with negroes and thinks they mistook Pinckeney for him. Over 100 armed whites are in the field after the negroes. Congressman Pinckeney wired that

he would leave Washington and would arrive at home Wednesday. Pinckeney was one of the leading planters in this


