DEMOCRATS are finding great fault with the way in which Chairman Cortelyou is managing the campaign. That is what he was put there for.

DEMOCRATS are now growling at Bryan because he has prophesied Roosevelt's election. A thing is not a "prophecy" that everyone knows.

DAVE HILL and Gassaway Davis went through Maryland and West Virginia like a vaudeville circus. They will find when the vote is counted that they were taken as a huge joke.

The ticket is Roosevelt and Fairbanks, Elkin, Sibley, Robertson, Kreitler and Harrison. And so good that nobody will think it worth while to bother trying to split his. Vote it straight.

At a large ratification meeting held by the Democrats in Washington, D. C., the picture of Parker and Davis appeared right over the word "Exit." We can't think of anything more appropriate.

It is said that Judge Parker is very particular in seeing that his cattle get their salt regularly. When he goes on that trip up Salt River on Nov. 9, he can lay in supplies for years to come.

The Democratic National Committee is soliciting contributions and offers a "prompt and personal acknowledgment" to all contributors. This is worse than throwing money away; better give it to the poor.

The reason why the Democratic party can not make their "organ" play is because a musical instrument is not capable of making a harmonious sound when its keys range from free silver to the gold standard and from free trade to protection.

The approach of the election in no way moderated President Roosevelt's severity with the steamboat inspectors whose carelessness or worse, was contributory to the General Slocum disaster, in which the lives of 955 Sunday school children and their parents were lost.

The New York Herald, the greatest among Parker's supporters in that city, has turned tail and gives up the fight and says he is licked. "It seems almost a foregone conclusion that Mr. Roosevelt will be elected," says the Herald. The Democratic hulk is "all in."

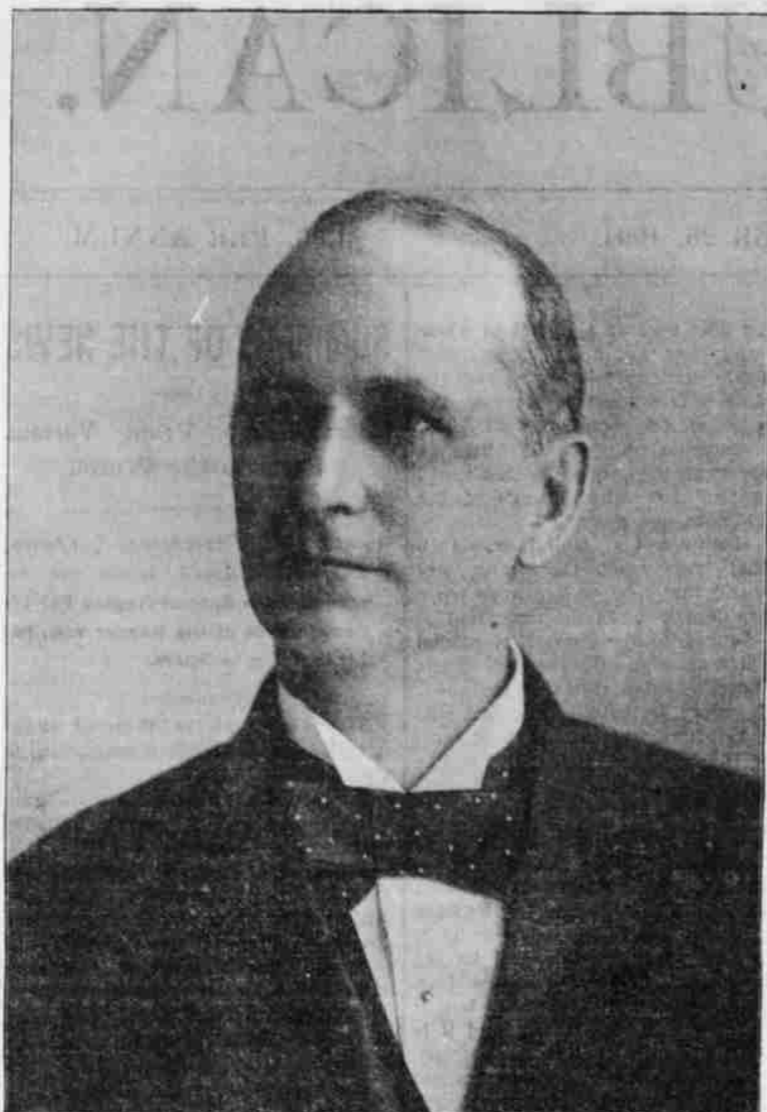

The late General Lawton declared that every word from an American opponent of the Philippine policy meant another bullet for an American soldier. Candidate Parker has by his incendiary speech, contributed bullets enough to wipe out the entire army of 15,000 men now in the Philippines.

In the light of recent campaign utterances from Mr. Parker and other leaders of the Democracy, President Roosevelt's assertion that "our opponents do not venture to recite the facts about our policies and acts and then oppose them. They attack them only when they have first misrepresented them," is more than verified.

JUDGE PARKER solemnly told some admirers who called at Esopus last week that over "two hundred thousand lives had been sacrificed in the Philippines." The facts are that the lives of only 4,263 American soldiers were lost, from all causes including the punishment of their own excesses, and a liberal estimate of the Philippine losses places them at less than 10,000, a total of 15,000 against Mr. Parker's 200,000.

At any rate Mr. Sibley is a whole meeting within himself, and those who have heard him once will not miss an opportunity to hear him after that. And those who have not had the good fortune to hear him will, we are sure, make an extra effort to be at one or all of these meetings. EX-SECRETARY OLNEY told a New York audience that it was costing the United States \$50,000,000 a year to retain the Philippines. Such carelessness of fact is almost criminal. The annual expense incurred by the United States is less than \$2,500,000. It is only a difference of a few ciphers, but such an error is inexcusable coming from an intelligent "statesman."

SO MUCH has been written about the President's use of the expression "big stick" that the connection in which he used it is interesting. He said, "To boast is bad, and carelessly to insult another, worse, yet worse than all is to be guilty of boasting, even without insult, and when called to the proof to be unable to make such boasting good. There is a homely old adage which runs: 'Speak softly and carry a big stick; you will go far.'"

CANDIDATE PARKER has been doing some remarkable "juggling" with statistics. For instance, he solemnly declares that the Philippines have cost this country \$50,000,000 in addition to the \$20,000,000 purchase price. And yet Mr. Parker must know that the actual cost of the Philippines to this government has been only \$184,180,000, including the \$20,000,000 purchase price. Is this sort of campaigning likely to increase the public's respect for the Democratic presidential candidate?

ALTHOUGH not excited over the matter, the Republicans of Forest county will all turn out to the election and support the straight ticket, there being no possible incentive for doing anything else. Never has there been less than to kick about in the Republican ranks than there is this year, and when the party members go to the polls to cast their votes they will do so with the feeling that they are doing that which is best for themselves and their neighbors and the country in general. Forest county ought to give a majority of between 600 and 700, no doubt getting close to the latter figure. We hope to see the vote the largest ever polled in the county, and we believe it will be, because of the universal desire to participate in the election of Roosevelt, and the whole State and county ticket. Prepare to be at the polls on the 8th of November.
