ROBBERS SCARED OFF. Punxsutawney, Pa., March 20.—An unsuccessful attempt was made by two unknown Italians to rob Rural Mail Carrier W. P. Brady at Highland Park, a densely wooded spot seven miles north of Punxsutawney.

NO COFFIN NAILS TO MINORS. Harrisburg, Pa., March 20.—Governor Pennypacker has approved a bill making it a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$300, for anyone to give or sell a cigarette or cigarette paper to any person under the age of 21 years.

SAVES WIFE AND CHILD FROM FIERY END. Beaver Falls, Pa., March 20.—Earl Usleton saved his wife and baby from burning to death Saturday morning. All were asleep. Mrs. Usleton swooned when she awoke and found the bedclothes afire.

HID IN CLOSET AND EVASD ARREST. Monongahela, Pa., March 20.—Two prisoners broke away from a policeman here and after being shot at and chased by 500 people escaped. They went to a boarding house and hid in a closet, where the police overlooked them while searching the house.

GIFT FROM ROCKEFELLER. Cleveland, March 20.—John D. Rockefeller has given \$25,000 to the Women's and Children's Free Dispensary of this city.

STRIKE ON SIBERIAN RAILROAD. Chita, Eastern Siberia, March 21.—Though the railroad men's strike on the section of the Siberian line east of Lake Balkal has ceased, the telegraph operators have now stopped work demanding an increase of wages.
