Pursuant to resolution of the Republican County Committee of Forest County, adopted at its meeting held February 27th, 1905, it is ordered that the Republican voters of said county meet on

SATURDAY, APRIL 15, 1905,

at 2 o'clock p. m., at the following named places of holding primary elections, to-wit:

- Barnett—Clarrington, Cooksburg, Red-clyde.
- Green—Nebraska, Guilleville Golinza, Harmony—West Hickory, Fogle Farm, Hickory—East Hickory.
- Howe—Brookston, Cooper Tract, Pigeon, Lynch, Porkey, Cloughs, Watson Farm.
- Jenks—Marientown, Dubring, Lamona, Kingsley—Mayburg, Keletville, Newtown Mills, Starr.
- Tionesta Township.
- Tionesta Borough.

At which time and places they will by their votes nominate:

- One person for Associate Judge.
 - One person for Prothonotary, &c.
 - One person for Sheriff.
 - Two persons for County Commissioner.
 - Two persons for County Auditor.
 - One person for Jury Commissioner.
 - One person for State Delegate.
- Each election precinct will also elect one person for member of the County Committee for the ensuing year.
- The polls will remain open till 7 p. m.
- Return Judges will convene at the Court House, Tionesta Borough, on the following Tuesday, April 18, 1905, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Attention is called to the Act of June, 1881, regulating primary elections, that Judges and Clerks, before entering upon the discharge of their duties, shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in presence of each other.

Attention is also directed to the following resolution adopted by the County Committee at its last meeting:

Resolved, That all Republicans are required to vote in their proper primary precincts, where such is possible, and in case the voter is unable to reach his proper voting place he shall, before voting, be obliged to have at least two Republican voters vouch for his Republicanism and legal right to vote.

Proper election blanks and tickets will be mailed to the committeemen of the different precincts in due time. It is their duty to see that these are promptly on hand on the day of the primaries.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY RULES.

RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.

1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one or more of the county papers at least one week previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office and subject to the action of the party at said primary meetings.

2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock p. m., and proceed to elect one person for Judge and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock p. m. After the polls are opened the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person being allowed to vote more than once for the same office.

3. After the polls are closed the board shall proceed to count the vote that each candidate has received, and make out the returns accordingly to be certified by the Judge and attested by the Clerks.

4. The Judge (or one of the Clerks appointed by the Judge) of the respective election district shall meet at the Court House, in Tionesta, on the Tuesday following the Primary Meetings at 2 o'clock p. m., having the returns and a list of voters, and the person having the highest number of votes for any office, shall be declared the nominee of the Republican party.

5. The Return Judges shall be competent to reject by a majority vote the returns from any district where there is evidence of fraud, either in the returns or otherwise, and shall reject them where there is evidence of three or more persons voting at the Primary Meetings who are not Republicans.

6. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office the judges shall proceed to ballot for a choice, the person having the highest number to be the nominee.

7. The Return Judges shall appoint Conferees—Representative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointment shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes cast for that office.

8. The Return Judges may at any time change the mode and manner of selecting candidates as they may be instructed by the people at their primary meetings, due notice being given by the County Committee.

9. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be required to issue a call in pursuance of the action of the County Committee.

County Bridge Painting.

As per Act of Assembly, approved April 21, 1903, the Commissioners of Forest County will receive sealed proposals for the painting of the following bridges:

Bridge across Tionesta Creek at Foxburg, Howe Twp. Length of span, 173 feet; width of roadway 16 feet in clear.

Bridge across Maple Creek, at or near the mouth, Bards Twp. Length of span, 64 feet; width of roadway, 16 feet in clear.

All guard rails and all iron and steel to be first thoroughly cleaned by removing all scales and blisters and then to be thoroughly painted one coat with a paint of established reputation for five years durability on metal surfaces, and to be guaranteed to remain in good and effective condition for five years from date of painting; all loose nuts to be tightened. Contractor to furnish all materials, also furnish and remove all scaffolding. Bids will be received on each separate bridge, as above. All work to be completed on or before the first day of September, 1905. All bids must be on file in the Commissioners' office in Tionesta, on or before the first day of May, 1905. The Commissioners reserve the right to reject any or all bids.
