Republican Primaries.

The Republican primary election for Forest county takes place next Saturday afternoon, 15th, and from present appearances there will be a full vote polled, which is as it should be. A full vote means, as a general rule, a fair expression of the voters, and that is what every true Republican desires. The canvass has been a quiet one, practically free from slander or bitterness, and that is the way it should end. There are enough candidates in the field to insure a good turnout in every precinct, provided each one's friends take the interest they should. Let no Republican stay at home, but let all come out and vote their choice and then abide by the result.

Very Tough Legislation.

Two or three bills that have passed the legislature this session stand out in particular prominence as "tough legislation," and the wonder is that they could get enough votes in a body of men supposed to represent an honest constituency to pass them finally, but such seems to have been the case. They are known as the Publ bill and the Ehrhardt bill, all of them designed to hamper if not totally destroy the beneficent work of the law and order and other kindred societies of the State. They are bills which no self-respecting representative would support. Of these obnoxious measures, aiming to protect all forms of vice, the Philadelphia Press says:

"According to all information the Publ bill, passed finally by the Legislature two weeks ago, has never reached the Governor. This is an extraordinary circumstance, though there is no law requiring a bill to be sent to the Governor at any particular time, except on the morning of adjournment. The fact that this bill has been withheld indicates there was some pretty direct information that it would not meet with executive approval. There were several kindred measures intended to protect vice, known as the Ehrhardt bills, which were following on after the Publ bill. If the Publ bill had gone to the Governor and been promptly returned with a veto it would have ended the Ehrhardt bills. They have been held up for some time, significantly. It seems to be somewhat uncertain whether they will now be put through or not. They are in such shape that there will be time enough next week to complete action on them. But if there is any information that the Governor will not approve the Publ bill, why should he be expected to let the others, aiming at the same object, get by? The best thing that can be done is to let these disreputable measures sleep where they are. The members in both houses have gone on record in several votes, and that record will constantly plague many of them, but it will plague them much less if the bills are not allowed to become laws."

Republican Primary Election.

Pursuant to resolution of the Republican County Committee of Forest County, adopted at its meeting held February 27th, 1905, it is ordered that the Republican voters of said county meet on

SATURDAY, APRIL 15, 1905, at 2 o'clock p. m., at the following named places of holding primary elections, to-wit:

Barnett—Clarrington, Cooksburg, Redcliffe.

Green—Nebraska, Gaitonville Golliza, Harmony—West Hickory, Fogle Farm, Hickory—East Hickory.

Howe—Brookston, Cooper Tract, Pigeon, Lynch, Porkey, Cloughs, Watson Farm.

Jenks—Marienville, Duhring, Lamona, Kingsley—Mayburg, Kellettsville, Newtown Mills, Starr.

Tionesta Township, Tionesta Borough.

At which time and places they will by their votes nominate:

One person for Associate Judge. One person for Prothonotary, etc. One person for Sheriff.

Two persons for County Commissioner. Two persons for County Auditor. One person for Jury Commissioner.

Each election precinct will also elect one person for member of the County Committee for the ensuing year.

The polls will remain open till 7 p. m. Return Judges will convene at the Court House, Tionesta Borough, on the following Tuesday, April 18, 1905, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Attention is called to the Act of June, 1881, regulating primary elections, that Judges and Clerks, before entering upon the discharge of their duties, shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in presence of each other.

Attention is also directed to the following resolution adopted by the County Committee at its last meeting:

Resolved, That all Republicans be required to vote in their proper primary precincts, where such is possible, and in case the voter is unable to reach his proper voting place he shall, before voting, be obliged to have at least two Republicans vouch for his Republicanism and legal right to vote.

Proper election blanks and tickets will be mailed to the committeemen of the different precincts in due time. It is their duty to see that these are promptly on hand on the day of the primaries.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY RULES.

RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.

1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one or more of the county papers at least three weeks previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office and subject to the action of the party at said primary meetings.

2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock p. m., and proceed to elect one person for Judge and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock p. m. After the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person be-

ing allowed to vote more than once for the same office.

3. After the polls are closed the board shall proceed to count the vote that each candidate has received, and make out the returns accordingly to be certified by the Judge and attested by the Clerks.

4. The Judge (or one of the Clerks appointed by the Judge) of the respective election district shall meet at the Court House, in Tionesta, on the Tuesday following the Primary Meetings at 2 o'clock p. m., having the returns and a list of voters, and the person having the highest number of votes for any office, shall be declared the nominee of the Republican party.

5. The Return Judges shall be competent to reject by a majority vote the returns from any district where there is evidence of fraud, either in the returns or otherwise, and shall reject them where there is evidence of three or more persons voting at the Primary Meetings who are not Republicans.

6. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office the judges shall proceed to ballot for a choice, the person having the highest number of votes to be the nominee.

7. The Return Judges shall appoint Conferees—Representative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointment shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes cast for that office.

8. The Return Judges may at any time change the mode and manner of selecting candidates as they may be instructed by the people at their primary meetings, due notice being given by the County Committee.

9. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be required to issue a call in pursuance of the action of the County Committee.
