PRESIDENT ROOSLVELT'S order that Wilkes-Barre shall have the full benefit of its compound name in the post office and other government departments, instead of having the rather meaningless reference of Wilkesbarre, will cause unbounded joy in that good old town. The name was adopted in honor of two members of the English Parliament, who were friends of this country when friends were needed, and the ordinary way of using the names destroyed the purpose and meaning. Officially recognized by the national government as Wilkes-Barre, that style will obtain everywhere.

THE percentage of American-born children to the general population of this country has materially decreased since the time of the civil war The figures of a census bulletin on the subject, based upon comparison of the eighth with the twelfth census, disclose a startling falling off in child propagation among Americans. In 1860 the number of children under five years of age to one thousand of women between the ages of fifteen and forty-five, was six hundred and thirtyfour. In 1900 it was only four hundred and seventy-four.
