THE Republican ticket at the head of this column is worthy the hearty support of every member of the party in the county.

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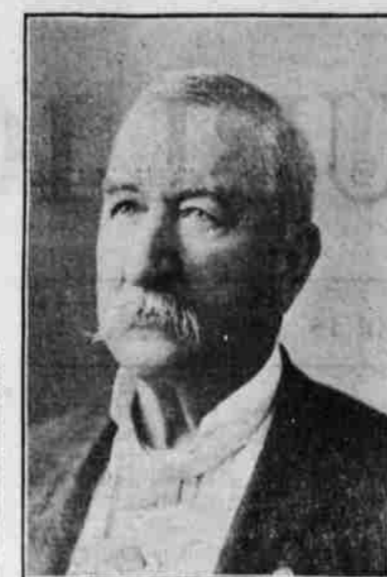

USING INFERIOR MATERIALS.

Evidence Against Officials and Contractors of Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Oct. 16.—The hearing in the case of Abraham L. English, director of public safety during the administration of Mayor Ashbridge, and four others accused of conspiracy to defraud the city was resumed before Magistrate Eisenbrown.

The other defendants are Philip H. Johnson, architect; John W. Henderson and Henry E. Baton, members of the contracting firm of Henderson & Co., and James D. Finley, former building inspector.

The testimony presented tended to show that in the construction of the new smallpox hospital inferior materials had been improperly used; that Inspector Finley had reported favorably upon the work, and that the original specifications had been fraudulently changed.

Former Judge Gordon, who prosecuted the case for Mayor Weaver, endeavored to establish the fact that a criminal conspiracy to defraud the city existed among the defendants in awarding the contract and in the construction.

THE ABNER M'KINLEY TANGLE.

Widow, Newly Married Again, Asked In Court to Give Accounting.

Somerset, Pa., Oct. 16.—A sensation was created here by the announcement that A. F. Kennedy of New York city had filed exceptions in the local courts to the accounting of Mrs. Annie McKinley, executrix of the estate of the late Abner McKinley, brother of President McKinley.

Mr. Kennedy has a claim against the estate of \$472.60, which he says he is unable to collect. He says in his petition that Mrs. McKinley has failed to account for \$80,000 life insurance of the late Abner McKinley, and that she also failed to account for the sum which Abner McKinley received from the estate of his brother William, which is supposed to have been close to \$80,000.

To add to the entanglement Mrs. McKinley was married on last Monday to John B. Allen of Tampa, Fla., in Baltimore, and the couple are now supposed to be on their way to Florida, where they will live. Abner McKinley, who died about two years ago, was supposed to have been a very wealthy man.

Did Not Agree on New Mill.

Sharon, Oct. 16.—It has been learned that the disagreement between Alexander W. Thompson, president of the Republic Iron and Steel company, and John W. Gates, said to be the largest stockholder of the combine, came about through the desire of the latter to build a \$2,000,000 wire mill at Youngstown to compete with the United States Steel corporation.

Thompson did not want the mill, claiming it was out of line with the other mills of the company. The annual meeting will be held at Jersey City Oct. 18, when a new president will be chosen.
