BANK SCANDAL SPREADING.

Cashler Clark of Enterprise Nationa Short \$300,000 in Accounts.

Pittsburg, Oct. 30 .- Developments in the affairs of the Enterprise Na tional bank of Allegheny City were sensational. Receiver John B. Cun ningham entered suit against W. H Andrews, territorial delegate fron New Mexico, for \$52,000, charging hin with fraudulently conspiring with F R. Nicholls, his private secretary, and Lee Clark, the dead cashier of the bank, unlawfully to procure funds by the proceeds of negotiable paper. I is intimated that other suits involving prominent persons are to be entered in the case.

It was reported that a shortage o \$300,000 has been discovered in the ac counts of Cashier Clark.

This amount is supposed to have been loaned out without security, ne records being made of the transac tions. It was further discovered, it is said, that loans were made without proper security to other prominent rersons in this section and that the evidence gathered by the examiners is so complete that it is almost suffi cient ground for the prosecution of the persons involved.

Every day brings additional evi dence of missing collateral pledged for loans in the Enterprise National bank and in many instances it is be lleved these securities have been re hypothecated. When several persons called to pay their loans, Receiver Cunningham found that the collateral which should have been attached to the notes was missing and the borrow ers refused to pay the notes unless the collateral was returned.

MONEY IN BABY CART.

More of Express Messenger Cunliffe's Booty Found by the Detectives.

Pittsburg, Oct. 30 .- Superintenden! H. J. Biderman of a detective agency went to the home of Edward Cunliffe the Adams Express robber, Saturday, and in the lining of a baby carriage found a package containing \$5,000 of the \$101,000 stolen on Oct. 9.

On the night Cunliffe was brought here from Bridgeport, Conn., where he was captured, he made a written con fession to the authorities that he had giten his wife \$5,000.

Mrs. Cunliffe, who in the meantime had moved to her father's home at Hartford, Conn., denied that she had the money. She was repeatedly ques tioned, however, and told the detectives at Hartford where the money could be found

The authorities say that there now remains about \$6,000 not accounted for.
