



Hood was born March 1, 1828, in Caual township, Venango county, Pa., and died at his home in Tionesta March 28, 1996; he was therefore aged 78 years and 24 days at the time of his death. He was a son of William Hood and Polly Sutley-Hood, early pioneers of Venango county. His father died when he was about three years old, and he was raised by his grandfather, whose name was also William Hood, the latter being one of the first settlers of Old Venango.
