He is saying: "So far as I can see, everything is all right, and we expect to find it so." So the much looked-for "mare's nest" was conspicuous by its absence. We hope Mr. Berry will leave the office at the end of his term with as clean a balance sheet as he found it.

FOR some while back the Oil City Blizzard has been looming the Smith family for Governor of Pennsylvania, making particular choice of two representatives—Charles Emory, of the Philadelphia Press, and William O., of the Punxsutawney Spirit. When it comes to the latter named we chime right in, and we decidedly refuse to go one step farther because we might fare much worse. William O.'s own Smith by a long shot. The Titusville Herald also endorses the Smith idea, as witness the following editorial from a recent issue of that paper: "Known in every community, honored and respected, the great family of Smith has more members than any other in the Commonwealth. No neighborhood, however small, but that has one or more distinct branches of this famous old clan, names ranging all the way from Schmidt and Smythe down to the common everyday Smith. He has been Postmaster General and has occupied many positions of high responsibility in Philadelphia. There's William Orlando, editor of the Punxsutawney Spirit, whose editorials are quoted everywhere, the English language is written. He is five terms in the Pennsylvania Legislature and two terms in Congress. He is 47 years old. He is clean, honest, and his people down in Jefferson county set lots of store by him. Here are two men, either of whom might bring harmony into the party; either of whom is capable and honest and free from contamination. We side with The Oil City Blizzard. Let us have a Smith for Governor. He would certainly receive the family vote, and that would go a long way toward his election."

ANTIQUÉ SEVRES.

You Can Always Distinguish the Genuine by Its Gilding. False Sevres in the bric-a-brac shops is offered as genuine by "reputable dealers" in London and Paris as well as but only as old as the "restoration" in France, although the marks would indicate a much earlier and better period. The counterfeiters may usually be detected by the surface of the gilding. In the real it was burnished in lines by means of metal nails with rounded points, which were set in a piece of wood.

The imitations of later date than the real have been burnished in a similar manner, but with an agate. It required considerably more force to obtain a bright surface by the agate point than by the use of the agate point; hence the burnished lines in the genuine ware are perceptibly sunken, while in the counterfeit they are flush with the general surface of the gilding. There are other means of "spotting" the imitations, such as the incorrect copying of the marks which have served since 1753 to denote the date of fabrication, and the use of chrome green, which was not discovered until 1802, but the test of the burnished parts of the gilding is the easiest for the ordinary buyer.—New York Herald.

Earnings.

Girls who are fond of earrings may perhaps be interested in hearing a few facts about them. Said it is for the emancipated woman of the present day to learn that these fashionable ornaments were originally a mark of slavery. In bygone days the slave always wore his master's earrings. In the east they were a sign of caste and were buried with the dead. Some ancient earrings were very elaborate, and many statues had their ears bored in readiness for votive offerings of earrings. In England the earliest earrings were very cumbersome and made of stone or wood.
