Opinions of the Press on the Nomination of Mr. Wheeler for Congress.

We give below excerpts from the comments of the press, both in and out of the district, on the nomination of Hon. N. P. Wheeler, of Endeavor, as the Republican candidate for Congress in the 28th District.

Though Mercer county was first to join with Forest in making the nomination, the conferees and candidates from the other two counties—Warren and Venango—lost no time in getting in out of the wet, and all seemed heartily glad that when they couldn't have the honor themselves they feel that it is going to a man well worthy of the honor and competent to fill the high office.—Ridgway Advocate.

Hon. N. P. Wheeler of Endeavor has been nominated by the Republicans of the Twenty-eighth district for the seat made vacant by the expiration of Hon. J. C. Sibley's term. Mr. Wheeler is a representative citizen and a successful business man. He is the first candidate ever presented for congress from Forest county. The Herald congratulates the county and Mr. Wheeler. His election is assured.—Titusville Herald, 14th.

In Mr. Wheeler the conference has given to the Republican party the strongest and best man that could have been selected. He is one of Forest county's substantial business men and the many messages of congratulation which he received from every county in the district, while in Franklin, is convincing that the people are satisfied. One of the happy coincidences was that last Tuesday, June 12, was the twenty-ninth anniversary of his wedding day.—Marienville Express.

Nelson P. Wheeler of Endeavor, Forest county, has been nominated by the district conference as the Republican candidate for Congress in the 28th district composed of Venango, Warren, Forest, Mercer and Elk counties. We extend congratulations to Mr. Wheeler and to Forest county. We trust that Forest county may have the opportunity to congratulate Clarion county on the selection of F. J. Maffitt of Clarion as the candidate in this congressional district.—Clarion Republican.

While the Hon. N. P. Wheeler, the Republican candidate for congress in the twenty-eighth district, was regarded as a dark horse, and his nomination came as a great surprise, nobody acquainted with the man or having a knowledge of conditions in the district, has the slightest doubt of his triumphant election. The Democrats will experience difficulty in finding a man who can make even a respectable showing against the popular Forest county lumberman.—Titusville Herald, 16th.

It was generally conceded by all the conferees that a stronger man than Mr. Wheeler could not have been nominated. He represents all that is required of a representative in Congress. He is free from all factions, is a good business man, honest and conscientious to the last degree, and a man against whom nothing can be said. He is invulnerable to attack on any point and, with the united support of all good Republicans, should carry the district by a large majority.—Franklin News.

On the fifth ballot the Forest county conferees voted for Mr. Whitta, Mercer county's candidate, and by his direction, though he was assured it would mean his defeat, the Mercer county conferees refused the compliment. Two of the men from Elk followed suit, and Mr. Wheeler was declared the winner. Mercer county Republicans will be disappointed that Mr. Whitta did not win, but they may be satisfied that the plum goes to Mr. Wheeler. His nomination means an election and he will doubtless take good care of the interests of his Mercer county constituents.—Mercer Dispatch.

While there is some disappointment in Warren county over the result, as it was hoped that the honor would come to this county through its candidate, Hon. H. H. Cummings, all classes of Republicans unite in saying that Mr. Wheeler will make an ideal candidate, and is a credit to the Republican party. The Mail is willing to accept the decision of the conference, and will give Mr. Wheeler the same hearty support that it would have accorded Mr. Cummings had he been the successful candidate, and we predict that Mr. Wheeler

will make a strong and winning fight in this county and district.—Warren Mail.

Mr. Wheeler owes his nomination not only to his clean reputation and high standing as an honorable business man but also to the enthusiastic manner in which he was supported by friends in Forest county. Their confidence and enthusiasm in the candidate seemed to be contagious and it set the other conferees to thinking that a man who stood so high and was so admired at home must be worthy of the honor they had to bestow. The office was seeking such a man, and having found him, the conferees lost little time in crowning him with the honor of being the standard bearer of the Republican party in the district.—Ridgway Advocate.

Hon. N. P. Wheeler made the nomination for Congress from this district Tuesday at Franklin on the sixth ballot. It goes without saying that we are disappointed in that our home candidate, Hon. H. H. Cummings, did not win out for the nomination. But if he was not to win we certainly are pleased and gratified that Mr. Wheeler was successful. No doubt the other candidates would have represented the district with honor, but we, right here at home, thoroughly know both Mr. Wheeler and Capt. Cummings. Both have been identified with Tidoute, and both have many friends here. And as we have remarked if it wasn't to be our purely home candidate, Mr. Wheeler stands next, and we are peculiarly gratified in his selection.—Tidoute News.

In appearance Nelson P. Wheeler is a man of 55 years of age, he wears a full short beard and might be taken for a lawyer, doctor or business man. He has an intelligent face, a pleasing address and looks like a man one can tie to, and talk to without feeling at all embarrassed. He is a wealthy lumberman, and resides at a small town called Endeavor, which town he just about owns. He was born at Portville in the state of New York, but for thirty years has resided at Endeavor, where he has a big mill and a large number of employees who speak in the highest terms of his generosity and kindly feelings for his workmen. He is married and has a family and has had some experience in legislation, having been a member of the legislature of this state several years ago.—Sharon Telegraph.

The nomination of Hon. Nelson P. Wheeler, of Forest county, for Representative in Congress from this district upon the sixth ballot at the first meeting of the delegates, was a compliment most worthily bestowed. Many had been led to expect a protracted and long drawn-out session, owing to the strength and prominence of the men who had been announced as candidates. Each of the five counties had a favorite son, and all were able and representative men. These facts render the selection of Mr. Wheeler all the more notable, and demonstrate that he must be of the right sort to displace the strong timber that confronted him. Mr. Wheeler has always been a staunch Republican, and taken a deep interest in the politics of his county and state. He has built up the model town of Endeavor in Forest county, where he has made his home for many years. He has traveled extensively and his business interests have taken him to all parts of the country. While one of the largest manufacturers of lumber in the state, he is also interested in oil and familiar with every phase of the oil industry. Mr. Wheeler is a man of great ability and strength of character. He has served in the State Legislature as Representative from Forest county, and held many official positions of trust and honor in his town and county. He is in full accord with the platform and principles of the Republican party and, as a man of practical affairs, is bound to become a conspicuous figure in the next House of Congress.—Oil City Derrick.

Next only thing thus far urged against N. P. Wheeler, the Republican nominee for Congress in this district, is that his home, at Endeavor, is called "Bonniebrae." That this is rather aesthetic and Scottish, for Forest county, must be admitted. Ordinance No. 19. An Ordinance to repeal Section Twenty-one of an Ordinance establishing a Board of Health in the Borough of Tidoute.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Tidoute, Pa., and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same, that Section Twenty-one of an Ordinance of the Borough of Tidoute, Pa., establishing a Board of Health in the Borough of Tidoute, approved the sixteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, which reads as follows: "Section 21. Between the first day of June and the first day of October in each year and at such other times as the Board of Health may direct, no dog shall be allowed to be at large upon any of the streets, alleys or highways of the Borough of Tidoute, without being properly muzzled, not with merely a strap around the jaws, but with a wire or metal muzzle, in such a way that the animal cannot bite, and it shall be the duty of the Health Officer, Poundmaster, or any of the Police-men finding any dog running at large upon any of the said streets, alleys or highways, without being muzzled as above specified, to place such dog in a pound to be provided for such purpose, there to be kept for a period of not less than three days, unless sooner reclaimed by the owner as hereinafter provided, at the expiration of which three days such dog shall be killed, as provided by rule thirty-one of the Board of Health, which is enacted, adopted and made part of this ordinance," be and the same is hereby repealed.

And now June 13th, 1906, the above ordinance is not approved for the following reasons, viz: First, There have been many complaints made to the Burgess in regard to the dogs owned by Chas. Lanson, Abe Hepler, and Robert Fulton as being cross and not safe to run at large without a muzzle. Second, A majority of the Board of Health is unfavorable to the repeal of the ordinance, unless an ordinance be passed to require the owners of dogs to keep their dogs from running at large. Third, Many citizens are not in favor of the repeal of the above section.
