Mr. Canfield has been so long in the livery business in this place that his retirement will seem very odd to our citizens.  
James W. Neill, who was born at Neilltown, Forest county, but has resided for many years at Franklin, died in that city Saturday as the result of injuries received in a fall from the steps leading to his rooms and landing on the stone steps below, a distance of several feet. He was aged 70 years, and has relatives still living at Neilltown and vicinity. He was the son of "Squire" Thomas Neill, an old and influential resident of that section.  
The Johnstown Democrat makes the following magnanimous proposition: "The Democrat is still willing to arrange with anyone who wants a job to fish on shares. At Harrisburg the school authorities have pronounced coeducation in the high school a failure, and the boys and girls will be placed in different buildings as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made. The principal trouble with coeducation, it is stated, is that the boys and girls became so interested in social functions that they neglected their studies. There was scarcely a week in which there was not one or more social affairs to distract the pupils and to keep them out late at night, to the neglect of the work of the school. What has been found true of the Harrisburg high school we doubt not is true of hundreds of schools of the same kind throughout the country.  
Whoever tells you the potato crop is a failure hereabouts this year, tell him he's dreaming. The early varieties are not up to the standard in size and quantity to be sure, but the late tubers are making up for the deficiency. Last week Mrs. Henry Sibble, of German Hill, left a large size grape basket containing nine potatoes at this office, the nine just filling the basket, and averaging a trifle over a pound each in weight. Their entire patch will average nearly as good as this sample, running about ten hills to the bushel. We hear of other yields which show for nearly as good a turnout, and farmers are not looking for any sort of blight that is liable to diminish the crop.  
Messrs. Wagner & Wilson, who finished lumbering at Marienville last summer, have lately engaged extensively in the same pursuit in the western country, have purchased a large plant at Monroe, near Seattle, Wash., the consideration being \$350,000. The deal includes the entire mill plant and timberholdings of Stephens Brothers, consisting of large saw, shingle and planing mills. These have a combined capacity of 100,000 feet of lumber per day and 120,000 shingles. Included in the deal also were one and one-half million feet of lumber in stock, four or five million feet of logs in the pond, eight miles of standard gauge railroad, locomotive, trucks, donkey engines with full equipment for large logging operations; about one hundred and sixty million feet of standing timber, one hundred and fifty head of live stock, and all the store and office buildings.

The Francis oil company, on the property known as the Ship & Diehl tract, about five miles from Marienville, on the road leading to the Buffam Farm, struck a well last week that bids fair to make a 50 barrel pumper. After being shut the well was pumped for four hours and put 35 barrels of oil in the tank, when it was shut down pending the laying of a pipe line. The new strike has created considerable excitement, and leases are being eagerly sought for. The company will have a large force employed soon in the rapid development of the territory.  
During the past week Kelleitville has surpassed all former seasons by the splendor of its social functions. The event was an elegantly appointed luncheon, on Thursday, at the home of Mrs. Shewman, where Mesdames Watson, Shewman and Slocum entertained seventy-five of their lady friends. The rain interfered somewhat with the plans of the hostesses but not with the joyousness and hilarity of the guests. During the afternoon the ladies were treated to the unusual experience of a tram ride, visiting Mr. Watson's mills, viewing the immense stores of lumber, and some there who were not but indulge in the feminine delight of shopping. The guests included friends from Tionesta, Nebraska, Hickory, Endeavor and Kelleitville and one and all are loud in their praises of Kelleitville hospitality. In the afternoon and evening the finest weather favored the hostesses and their friends and all returned to their homes with the expression that they had never been afforded such a pleasant entertainment so heartily enjoyed by everyone.  
The annual picnic of the W. R. C. at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Lederer, German Hill, Friday last, while perhaps not just as largely attended as some former ones, was fully as great a success in pleasure and enjoyment for those who were present, of whom there were between seventy and eighty. A gorgeous luncheon was spread upon the long table under the apple trees, the variety and amplitude of which was a sight for the gods. The discussion of this feast occupied something like an hour of time, at the finish of which Judge Irwin regaled the "nickers" with one of his usually classical orations, concluding with the presentation of a dozen solid silver spoons to the genial host and hostess on behalf of those who have in years past enjoyed these annual gatherings. **A Sad Bereavement.**  
Many friends will learn with sorrow of the death of Dorothy Rebecca, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. W. G. Morrow, of West Hickory, which occurred under very distressing circumstances while they were visiting the old home of Mrs. Morrow at Kelleitville, Indiana county, on Thursday last. The child had been ailing with bowel trouble for a few days past and in the morning about 8 o'clock the father had administered a mild dose of medicine, in attempting to swallow which the little one was choked, some of the medicine lodging in the larynx. Before aid could be rendered the child became unconscious, and though the doctor almost immediately performed the operation of tracheotomy, thus restoring respiration, it was impossible to save the babe's life. It was some hours later before other physicians could arrive, and the child was kept alive for seven hours, death ensuing at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.
