The senator correctly diagnoses the situation, and it may be added that his course as a public man in recent years has eliminated him as a possibility, so he need not worry about the lightning striking in his direction.

THERE are various kinds of reciprocity, reasons the Oil City Blizard. One is a denatured species, a kind of a returning of evil for good. It is on the principle that "one good turn deserves another," the beneficiary being the same in each case. "Give them an inch and they'll take an ell," describes it. RECENT DEATHS.

KING.
William Henry King was born near Conneaut Lake, Pa., August 1, 1822, and died at his home in Hickory township, Forest county, Pa., December 14, 1906, after a decline in health continuing over the past two or three years. August 26, 1849, he was united in marriage with Miss Clarinda Beach. The union resulted in the birth of eleven children, ten of whom, with the aged wife, survive, as follows: Mrs. Thos. Mills, of Corydon, Pa.; Ira, of Clarion county; Mrs. Allen Moore, of Nansen, Elk county; Wilson, of East Hickory; Mrs. Henry Miller, of Hickory township; Mrs. Elma Acker, of Smethport, Pa.; George, of East Hickory; Stephen, of Whig Hill; Mrs. George Slater, of Clarion county; Joseph, of Endeavor, Pa. In 1876 Mr. King moved with his family to this county, locating on a farm in Beaver Valley, Hickory township, in the vicinity of which he had made his home since, following farming and gardening for the most part.

Mr. King was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, a professing Christian from early manhood, when he affiliated with the Christian church. He was an ardent Republican in his political faith, having cast his ballot for the first candidate of that party for President, John C. Fremont, never wavering in his allegiance to the cause from that day forward, and he took pride in the fact that he had never missed an election from the time he was 21 years of age to the day of his death.

Funeral services were held yesterday, the body being laid to rest in the cemetery at East Hickory, Rev. Mr. Richards of the Evangelical church at Lickingville, officiating.

Goats as Moving Machines.

A flock of Angora goats was put on a rocky hillside that it was desired to have cleared and got into grass. It was such a tangle of brush and briars that it was with difficulty one could make a way through it. The goats actually ate their way in until it was penetrated with paths in all directions. After the leaves within reach were eaten they would stand on their hind feet with their fore feet in the branches and so eat the leaves higher up, or, if the brush was not too large, would throw their weight against and bend it to the ground, where others of the flock would help strip it of its foliage. The leaves would come out again only to be eaten off, then sprouts would come from the roots to share the same fate, until at the end of the second summer everything in the shape of a bush not over six feet tall except the pines and laurel was completely killed and white clover was beginning to appear. These goats with their long, curly, white fleeces attracted more attention probably than anything else on the place; but, as can be imagined, they had to be well fenced in, for they would run over a stone wall like dogs.—Country Life in America.

It was not a good poem either. James Smith, one of the authors of "Rejected Addresses," wrote it. Smith met one night at dinner in London Strachan, the famous English priater. Strachan, what with old age and gout, was most infirm. Indeed, he could hardly walk. But his mind was exceedingly powerful and brilliant, and he talked so well that Smith on his return home wrote the following doggerel about the old man:

Your lower limbs seemed far from stout
When last I saw you walk;
The cause I presently found out
When you began to talk.
The power that props the body's strength
In due proportion spread
In you mounts upward, and the strength
All settles in the head.

Though this was undeniably rank poetry and ranker flattery, it pleased Printer Strachan so well that he added to his will a codicil giving Smith \$15,000.
