Neighborhood Notes.

In an attempt to end her life at an early hour Friday morning, Mrs. M. F. Morley, a patient in the Woman's Christian Association hospital at Jamestown, jumped from a third story window after slipping her head through a noose of knotted clothes. The noose broke and she fell to the ground below, a distance of 30 feet. Both wrists were fractured but otherwise the woman was not seriously injured.

Judge Thomas has granted the compulsory non-suit asked by Col. J. Ross Thompson, in the \$10,000 damage suit brought by Mrs. Josephine Hamlin of Erie against the Pennsylvania railroad. The defendants took advantage of the state law that allows no damages to co-employees of any man working for the company, whose negligence was the cause of an accident resulting in the death of the co-employee.
