While coasting on the grounds of Congressman J. Sloat Fassett at Elmira Friday a boy named James Buckley met death in a peculiar manner. One of the limbs pierced the lad's neck, passing clear through and coming out on the opposite side under the collar bone. He lived but a few minutes.

Reyburn Elected Mayor.
Congressman John E. Reyburn, Republican, was elected mayor of Philadelphia, defeating former Minister to Italy William Potter, the Democratic and City Party candidate, by about 25,000 plurality. Black, Republican, for receiver of taxes, won over Franklin S. Edmonds, Democrat and City Party candidate, by about the same vote. A light vote was polled.

Aged Woman Burned to Death.
In a fire which broke out in the residence of Peter Schenck at Jamestown, N. Y., on Friday afternoon Mrs. Sophia Goldberg, 84 years old, mother of Mrs. Schenck, was burned to death and Mrs. Schenck was dangerously injured in attempting to rescue the two women.

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DATE OF CANNING ON LABEL.

Beveridge Amendment to Agricultural Bill Adopted.
Washington, Feb. 26.—The senate passed the agricultural appropriation bill carrying nearly \$10,000,000, the postoffice appropriation bill, carrying \$210,000,000; the pension appropriation bill, carrying \$145,000,000, and the bill authorizing the establishment of an agricultural bank in the Philippine islands.

The principal fight was over the Beveridge amendment to the agricultural bill requiring the packers to pay the cost of executing the meat inspection law. This amendment was defeated on a point of order. Mr. Beveridge obtained the addition of an amendment to the bill which requires that the date of canning and inspection shall appear on the labels of cans containing meat products.

The postoffice bill was passed in an hour and 15 minutes. Amendments adding \$1,388,759 for the extension of the pneumatic mail service and requiring that postal cars be lighted with electricity, were adopted.

Mr. Lodge obtained the passage of the Philippine agricultural bank bill. An amendment to this bill offered by Senator Culberson, declaring it to be the intention of the United States to abandon the islands as soon as a stable independent government shall have been established, was defeated.

The senate also passed a bill granting a service pension to army nurses. Those who are disqualified to earn a livelihood and have reached the age of 62 years, are to receive \$12 a month; those who have reached 70 years \$15 and 75 years \$20.

LARGEST HOUSE IN WASHINGTON

Perry Belmont to Build One With a Ground Space of 11,975 Feet.
Washington, Feb. 26.—Former Congressman Perry Belmont of New York is to build the largest private residence ever erected in Washington. It will have a ground space of 11,975 feet and will be 234 feet wide on the front. The cost of erection will be about \$500,000, which is more, probably, than the cost of the most expensive residence heretofore erected in this city.

The house will occupy the greater portion of a triangular tract bounded by New Hampshire ave., R street and 18th street. It is designed in the style of Louis XIV, the plans being drawn by Sanson of Paris. It will be surrounded by a formal garden to be laid out by Duchesne of Paris.

Milk Pedler Died From Exposure.

Utica, Feb. 26.—Exhausted from battling all the morning in the snow drifts and the storm that prevailed in the country Warren W. Getman, a milk pedler in Waterville, asked permission of a customer to enter his barn to rest. Scarcely had the doors of the barn closed against the storm when Mr. Getman fell dead.

National Rifle Association.

New York, Feb. 26.—It was announced that the executive committee of the National Rifle association of America at a meeting in this city last Saturday took official action in designating Aug. 21st to 24th for holding the 197 matches of the association on the range of the Ohio National Guard at Port Clinton, O.

More Pay and Reduced Hours.

Announcement has been made at the headquarters of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in Cleveland that an advance of 8 per cent in wages and a reduction of from 12 to 8 hours in the working day has been granted to the engineers in the employ of the Lake Shore railroad.
