State Pension Bill.

Senator Cochran, Democrat, of Lycoming county, introduced a bill to pension Pennsylvania veterans of the civil war and it passed the senate by a vote of 42 to 1.

The bill affects those persons who were at the time of enlistment residents and continue to be residents of the state, and only these.

The amount is specified as follows: To those who served for one year or less, \$5 per month.

To those who served more than one year, and not more than two years, \$7.50 per month.

To those who served over two years, \$10 per month.

All applications for pensions shall be made to the auditor general and the right to such pensions shall be finally determined by the auditor general.

Section 5.—The pension to be granted shall begin on January 1st, 1898, and shall be payable quarterly thereafter on the first days of April, July, October and January of each year.

Section 6.—The necessary blanks for application and proof for pensions under this act shall be furnished by the auditor general.

Section 7.—The sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby specifically appropriated for the purposes of paying the pensions created hereby.

Should the above bill become a law, it will provide a pension in addition to that which is now received by the old veterans from the national government. It is entirely independent of, and not a substitute for, the national pension law.

Similar legislation has been on the statute books of Massachusetts and Maine for several years, but what prospect the bill has for passage at this session is difficult to say.

Pensions for Soldiers.—Congressman Wheeler Anxious to Assist War Survivors.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, WASHINGTON, March 18. To the Old Soldiers: AN ACT. "Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, That any person who has served 90 days or more in the military or naval service of the United States during the late Civil war or 60 days in the war with Mexico, who has been honorably discharged therefrom, and who has reached the age of 62 years or over, shall, upon making proof of such facts according to such rules and regulations as the secretary of the interior may provide, be placed upon the pension roll, and be entitled to receive a pension as follows: "In case such person has reached the age of 62 years, \$12 per month; 70 years, \$15 per month; 75 years or over, \$20 per month, and such pension shall commence from the date of the application on file in the bureau of pensions after the passage and approval of this act, etc. Approved February 6, 1907."

I would suggest to all of those soldiers who desire to make application for pension or increase of pension under the above act of February 6, 1907, to write me for blanks for that purpose and I will be pleased to furnish them. By writing me direct much time will be saved and the work of filing their claims will be much facilitated. I have just returned from a visit to Washington, D. C., to meet the officials of the different departments, and especially the pension bureau, in order to learn the process through which a claim must pass. It is my earnest desire to continue the energetic work carried on by my predecessor, Mr. Sibley.

Rolling on a Barrel. The public in general and life savers in particular should be warned of the danger and folly of rolling on a barrel the bodies of apparently drowned persons. This process has never yet helped to resuscitate, though it has undoubtedly killed many half-drowned persons. The idea that it "pumps out" the water is entirely fallacious. In the first place, no water enters the lungs of a drowned man until he has been absolutely dead for many hours. In the second, the removal of water from the stomach is quite a secondary consideration compared with the importance of re-establishing the action of heart and lungs, and rolling a body on a barrel is about the surest way of preventing both heart and lungs from resuming their normal functions. Artificial expansion and contraction of the chest by alternately stretching the arms above the head and compressing the chest with them is the correct first aid to the apparently drowned, but never can rolling on a barrel be anything but deleterious.—New York Times.

How to Detect Base Coin.
