NEW PARTY RULES.

Adopted by the Republican County Committee at Its Meeting July 26, 1907.

RULES OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY OF FOREST COUNTY.

RULE I. SECTION 1. All primary elections hereafter held in Forest County under the jurisdiction or control of the Republican party in said county, shall be conducted under and in conformity to the Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in relation thereto.

RULE II. SECTION 1. The general supervision, regulation and direction of the affairs of the Republican party in said county, shall be vested as heretofore in the Republican County Committee, which shall be composed of one member from each election district, who shall be elected by the qualified Republican electors of the several districts annually.

RULE III. SECTION 1. The Chairman of the retiring County Committee shall call the members of the newly elected committee together within thirty (30) days after their election for the purpose of organization, and shall call the committee to order for the purpose promptly at the hour of 2:00 o'clock on the day designated.

RULE IV. SECTION 1. The Secretary and Treasurer of the County Committee shall be appointed by the County Chairman.

RULE V. SECTION 1. In the absence, inability or refusal of the Chairman to preside over a meeting of the County Committee, it shall be the duty of the Secretary to act as Chairman pro tem, and should both Chairman and Secretary be absent, unable or refuse to preside over any regular or special meeting, the committee or their proxies may elect one of their number to act as Chairman for that meeting.

RULE VI. SECTION 1. Special meetings of the County Committee shall be held at the call of the County Chairman and at least five (5) days notice thereof shall be given by postal card or letter. At all meetings of the County Committee five (5) members thereof shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

RULE VII. SECTION 1. The County Chairman shall provide for the filling of any vacancy on the ticket caused by death, resignation or withdrawal or other reason, of any of the nominees of the party, and the Chairman shall at once call an emergency meeting of the County Committee to fill the vacancy, and in case such committee should fail to act or if such vacancy occur within five days of the election, the vacancy shall be filled by the Chairman of the Republican County Committee, with the advice and consent of the Secretary and of at least three members of the County Committee.

RULE VIII. SECTION 1. The County Chairman is hereby authorized to accept contributions and levy assessments on the various candidates of the party, for the purpose of defraying the legitimate expenses of the campaign.

RULE IX. SECTION 1. In case of a vacancy in the County Committee, whether occurring by death, resignation, removal or other cause, the Chairman shall fill the said vacancy upon suggestion of known Republican electors of said district.

RULE X. SECTION 1. The County Chairman of each election district shall appoint a vigilance committee of not less than three members from the Republican electors of his district, which committee shall be organized and the duties of the said County Chairman shall be chairman.

unable to attend any meeting thereof may substitute or appoint a qualified Republican voter resident of his district, or empower the Chairman by written authority to appoint a voter from his precinct with power to act for him thereat, as his proxy, which proxy shall be in writing duly executed and attested by witness.

RULE XI. At least fifteen (15) days before each primary election the Chairman of the County Committee shall send ten (10) printed handbills, giving date of primaries, to the County Committeeman of each election district and the County Committeeman shall post said handbills in conspicuous places in his election district at least ten (10) days before the primaries.

RULE XII. SECTION 1. None of the foregoing rules shall be changed or amended excepting in the following manner: All amendments shall be presented at a meeting of the County Committee, and such amendment or amendments shall not be voted upon until the succeeding meeting called for that purpose, which shall be held not less than twenty (20) days thereafter.

SECTION 2. Notice by postal card or letter shall be mailed to each member, with notice of proposed amendment or amendments and the time and place of the meeting; said notice shall be mailed within five (5) days after the preliminary meeting. A similar notice shall be given in the Republican papers of the county.

SECTION 3. The said amendment or amendments shall not be adopted unless they receive the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present.

SECTION 4. All rules heretofore existing governing the Republican party in said county be and the same are hereby repealed. Approved July 26, 1907, by County Committee.

A thousand farm hands are needed to help get in the crops and till the soil around Pittsburgh.

It will take \$50,000 to pay the men of the Second brigade, National Guard, for services in camp.

Roy Eddinger, a Pittsburg & Butler street railway lineman at Mars, received a shock of 3,500 volts and may recover.

The famous Kinzua Bridge, a well-known pleasure resort, has recently shown signs of collapse and active measures are being taken to strengthen the supports.

The Sunshine committee of Bradford has sent in another order to the New York Tribune association for fifty fresh air children, making a total of 135 to be taken in that city.

Arrangements have been made for the eighth annual picnic of the Grangers of Western Pennsylvania and Eastern Ohio which will be held in Grove's grove, Conneaut township, Crawford county, Thursday, Aug. 15.

On Saturday Judge Landis, of the Federal Court at Chicago fined the Standard Oil Co. \$29,240,000 for violations of the Elkins act of 1903, by accepting concessions equivalent to rebates. It is the heaviest fine ever imposed by any court in the world, but no concern in the world is as able to pay as the Standard.

Tyler L. Andrews, Game and Fish Warden for this section of the State, has authorized a warrant before Squire Happ, of Cherrytree township, Venango county accusing a Cherrytree man of killing four rabbits out of season and resisting an officer. The young man's father is quite willing to pay the \$40 and costs prescribed under the law for killing the rabbits, but he is endeavoring to compromise the other charge.

Pennsylvanians who have been evading the State law requiring marriage licenses by going to New York State to have the knot tied, will have to change their program after January 1st next, for a law similar to that of this state goes into effect at the time mentioned. Ministers living in towns along the line between the two States have been reaping a rich harvest since the Keystone State law went into force and this income will be lost to them.

Sylvester Emerick, an engineer on the Redford division of the Pennsylvania railroad, went ground hog hunting on Friday last near the state line in Bedford county. He was accompanied by his ten-year-old son and they became separated. Emerick saw something moving in the bushes and thinking it was a ground hog fired. He shot his son, killing him instantly. A year ago Emerick's daughter was accidentally shot and killed by a neighbor's son who was shooting rats with a rifle.
