Resignation.

The latest trusts formed are steering clear of rebates because railroads are shy on the subject. But it may be remarked of trusts that few die and none resign.

ONE of these days the trusts will discover that the constitution and laws of the country apply to them the same as to the common people and that they can not override either.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has issued an executive order making Labor Day, September 2, a holiday for government employees and laborers who are employed by the day.

VOTERS should not forget that October 5 is the last day on which to pay the poll tax. The last day to be assessed is September 4, and unless these formalities of the law are complied with people will not be permitted to cast their ballots under the new state law.

STATES have their rights under the national constitution and so has every citizen. There are means by which the just limitations can be defined without ill feeling, and those who cultivate needless friction on the subject are poorly employed.

SOME great English financiers has made the startling discovery that the trouble at the present time is simply that "the demand for money is greater than the supply." There are few of us who have not, at some time or other, experienced more or less trouble along this line.—Blizzard. Yes, yes, dear brother.

WHILE the corn crop in this section of the country is a practical failure, there will still be enough and to spare in the western states where the real crops are produced after all, and where, it is predicted, the yield will exceed 2,700,000,000 bushels, about 35 bushels for every man, woman and child in the United States. That will be enough.

THE Pittsburg Post, commenting on the speech of John O. Sheatz at Bernville, says: "We don't doubt his sincerity, because he is personally a good man." And again: "They would not have nominated as good a man as Mr. Sheatz if they had not been scared." This is the sort of campaign guff the Democratic newspapers of the state are giving their readers in their effort to elect another State Treasurer. They admit that the Republican candidate is an honest man and competent, but because he is a Republican, and for no other reason he should be defeated.

AS THE State road movement develops it becomes more and more evident that there will have to be some amendment to the law requiring State maintenance of the highways constructed under its care and with its aid. It is necessary to repair paved streets from year to year and it is just as necessary to give proper attention to the State highways. Be they ever so good it is certain that they will deteriorate and eventually cause a reaction against the good roads movement, unless there is proper provision for maintenance and repair. Too many supervisors along the new State roads are disposed to regard the work in the first instance as complete for all time. It is unreasonable to expect these roads to be any more durable than the paved streets, which require constant attention.—Sharon Telegraph.

IT will require six years and an expenditure of \$75,000,000 to construct the Lake Erie-Ontario river ship canal. It will be 113 miles long, 177 feet wide and thirteen feet deep. As projected, it will connect with Lake Erie, at a point near Ashtabula running southward through Creek valley, the Mahoning river and Beaver creek, and join the Ohio at Beaver, Pa. It will pass through Youngstown, New Castle, and Beaver and touch scores of furnaces and other industrial plants. Surveys have been completed, and the right of way is being acquired. It is further stated that digging will begin early next spring. For years it has been the dream of the ore and coal operators of the Pittsburgh district to establish a continuous water route between the great ore deposits of the Lake Superior region and coal belt of western Pennsylvania. Several years ago prominent Pittsburghers began putting the idea into concrete form, with the above results.

PROBERS' REPORT GUARDED.

Attorney General Todd Will Take No Chances on Its Being Stolen.

Harrisburg, Aug. 20.—Attorney General Todd has ordered guards to take charge of room 402 in the new Capitol, where the private papers and exhibits of the Capitol investigation commission have been stored.

The private work of the probers was performed in this room and when the commission adjourned yesterday all the papers were turned over to the attorney general to be used in the coming trials.

The care exercised to preserve these documents is one of many illustrations that have characterized the investigation as showing sincerity on the part of those in pursuit of the suspects.

It is regarded here as an indication that the attorney general and his associates will leave nothing undone that might aid the looters. No important developments are anticipated until Mr. Todd and his assistants meet here in conference. After this meeting the criminal indictments will be drawn and presumably presented to the Dauphin county grand jury on Sept. 23.

"Kid" Lairich of Titusville, has secured a position as umpire in the Virginia State League and has gone to assume his duties.

The offices of no less than five Erie dentists were entered between Saturday night and Monday morning and gold held valued at \$300 was taken.

The Forest Gas Co., of Tidouits, has been absorbed by the Citizens company of the same place. The consolidation had been under consideration for some time.

The "fair" season started last week with the Kittanning exhibition of four days. There will be a fair somewhere in Western Pennsylvania every week from this on till snow flies.

J. C. Sigworth, a lifelong resident of Lickingville, Clarion county, died on the 8th inst. of a complication of diseases, aged 87 years, and leaving a wife and several grown children.

Of the 1275 school teachers employed in Allegheny county only 75 are males, according to a report that district recently issued by the secretary of the State Department of Public Instruction.

Garmen Renzo, who is confined in the Indiana county jail under conviction on the charge of having murdered his sweetheart two years ago because she refused to marry him, is to be executed tomorrow the date fixed by the governor.

Dr. Phillip Dinsmore, the leading physician of Green county, aged 52, died recently as a result of poisoning from eating lead-stools, mistaking them for mushrooms. His son Thomas and little niece, Opal Evans, are in a critical condition.

The state board of charities has declined to approve the latest plans for the new Venango county jail at Franklin. The objections relate to some minor details of construction which can be remedied without difficulty. The cost of the building was to have been \$50,000, which will be increased to \$55,000 if the suggestions of the state board of charities are carried out.

A bag containing counterfeit coin was unearthed in an old barn in Walston, Jefferson county, by Sergeant Homer Chambers, of Troop D, State Police. A family which formerly lived near the barn, but which has recently moved from this state, has been held in suspicion by the authorities for some time. Further search brought to light a quantity of pewter.

The record for rod, hook and line fishing was broken at Conneaut Lake Tuesday of last week, when Messrs. William Stevenson and Alex. Wright, of Greenville, landed a monster muscalonge which tipped the beam at an even 41 pounds. The fish was 52 inches long and its girth at the largest part of the body measured 21 inches. A fish of the same species was killed in the lake with a spear, years ago, which is said to have weighed 32 pounds.

A dozen accidents in Erie county of which automobilists were the cause during the past week, have aroused the farmers and they threaten to go-gunning after auto drivers. Rural residents are indignant and are forming themselves into protective leagues to fight the automobile owners. The other night a swiftly speeding auto shot by a farmer's rig on the East Buffalo road near Erie. The top caught the horse's bridle and tore the harness from the horse's head. The farmer jumped to catch the horse but he got away and ran for over a mile with the owner's wife clinging to the seat of the carriage expecting to be hurled to death any minute.
