The county commissioners of Warren county are figuring on remodeling the Rouse hospital outbuildings. They may tear down a number of old buildings and erect a large barn.

General John Wiley, of Franklin, who has been in command of the 2d brigade of the N. G. P. since 1887, has been appointed major general to succeed Gen. Gobin, resigned. Col. Hulings, of Oil City, has received the appointment of commander of the 2d brigade to succeed Wiley.

The state of Minnesota recently tied up a shipment of box car goods from a Chicago firm. Of eighty-two samples taken from the shipment but two complied with the pure food laws of the state and every one of the packages were found a half pound short, which indicates how these fellows are enabled to underbid the home merchant.

McKinley Richmond, a 10-year-old negro, was sentenced by Judge Wilson, of Clarion to an indefinite period in the Morgantown Reformatory for shooting and killing his younger sister with a Flobert rifle because she struck him with a stone, in May last. The youthful homicide pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter, and was given a light sentence on account of his youth.

On a dare from a companion Harry Ryan, a Smethport glass worker, recently climbed to the top of the McKean county court house tower and for a time sat astride the neck of the goddess of justice on top of the tower. He then attempted the descent, lost his hold, and fell to the lawn below, a distance of one hundred and thirty-five feet. It is needless to say he lost his life because he would not take a dare.

Henry Lehna of West Newton, Pa., confessed rape and, Friday before Judge Thomas at Meadville, under the act of 1907, confessed to three separate counts on Alma Whitehead, aged 14 years, and stealing her money. This formal confession under the act does away with a trial and brings the defendant direct to the court for sentence, which will be passed in quarter sessions court this week. Lehna was told the maximum penalty was fifty five years.

That skunks eat bees is a discovery in natural history that has been made by Harry Rote, of Salina, Cranberry township. He had occasion to visit his hive on Tuesday and discovered a skunk stationed in front of one of the seeps and catching and guzzling the bees as they made their way out of the hive to commence their day of industry. Mr. Rote had a revolver with him, but wishing to preserve a safe distance between himself and the animal did not get close enough to land a bullet from his weapon into the body of the bee thief. He returned with his rifle and found the intruder still busy in depleting the swarm, paying no attention to the sting of the insects. Mr. Rote had much better success with his rifle, as the skunk dropped dead at the first shot.—Derrick.

Milton Sopher of Cherrytree township must serve eight years at hard labor in the Western penitentiary for criminally assaulting little Fannie Miles, daughter of a Breedtown farmer, on June 20 of this year. The sentence was administered by Judge Criswell of Venango county. It is the second longest sentence he ever imposed upon a criminal since his experience as a judge began. Sopher, who is 18 years of age and is of almost giant stature, assaulted the little girl in the woods near his home. A posse searched for him two days and he was arrested near Franklin. When arraigned in court at Franklin this week he entered a plea of guilty. When he came up for sentence Wednesday no member of his family was present, they evidently being satisfied to let him pay the penalty of the law for his monstrous crime. He was unaffected, expecting a more severe punishment.
