After the missile had passed through her neck, it struck the side of the Smart & Silberberg building, rebounded and, flying fully 150 feet, fell in the gutter where it was later found The other bultet had struck the lower under the skin, had penetrated her side and lodged near the backbone, passing around the muscles of the side. This wound was six inches in length.

The ante mortem statement of Mrs. Strail was taken several days ago, at which time she announced that she realized that she must die and gave an account of the shooting. That her husband was jealous without cause and she had left her home in Rouseville to work in Oil City because he failed to provide for wages and drank heavily and had noth- atternoon. ing left, usually, on pay day to give to her for her support. That about 6:30 on her to come back to live with him and upon her refusal had drawn a revolver from his hip pocket and shot her. This statement is fully corroborated by statements made to the press and police officers by the prisoner and by eyewitnesses to the shooting, of which there
