The picking of Concord grapes begins in earnest this week in the Chautauqua belt. A few have already been picked, but the grapes were hardly in good condition to demand the best prices, though two carloads were sold at Brocton at 22 cents for eight-pound baskets of Concord.

It turns out that the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad has made more money with a two cent passenger rate than it did before the rate was reduced. The reason is, there has been a large increase in travel.

Several months ago the Common Council of Jamestown adopted an ordinance directing that all poplar trees in the streets of the city be killed and that no more of the species be planted in the streets. The reason for this action, it was claimed, was because of the damage done by the roots of the trees which spread to a great distance, entering sewers and causing much material damage.
