When the plaintiff or other lein creditors become the purchaser, the costs or the writs must be paid, and a list of liens including mortgage searches on the proerty sold, together with such lien credit-or's receipt for the amount of the pro-ceeds of the sale or such portion thereof as he may claim, must be furnished the Sheriff.

2. All bids must be paid in full.
3. All sales not settled immediately will be continued until 2 o'clock p. m., of the next day, at which time all property not settled for will again be put up and sold at the expense and risk of the person to whom first sold.
