Sad Results of Partial Asphyxiation.

On December 5, at the plant of the Allegheny foundry in the Fourth ward, three men were almost asphyxiated with burnt gas in a tank car which was being erected at the plant. David Harding was one of the two men who went to the rescue of the first workman who lowered himself through the manhole and was overcome. Harding was in a very serious condition when taken out and was removed to Emergency hospital. After three days he had apparently recovered, was dismissed from the institution and went to his home at Grunderville, west of Warren. The day following his return home he was taken with a violent headache, and blindness followed. He then became delirious and has since remained in that condition. Last Saturday he was again taken to Emergency hospital for treatment, but became so violent it was necessary to remove him to the State Hospital for the Insane, where he is now confined as a raving maniac. There is a slight chance for recovery, but the chances are much against him and death may come at any time.—Warren Mirror.
