SOUTH AMERICA has 1,000,000 more habitable square miles than North America possesses. The prospect that the Southern Continent will catch up in small, but its resources give it a fine chance for a good second.

JACK LONDON, the author, for whom much anxiety has been felt, returned to San Francisco from Tahiti Friday on the steamer Mariposa. The Snark, in which Mr. London started on a seven-year trip around the world, was disabled and was left at Tahiti for repairs.

CHAIRMAN ANDREWS has issued his call for the meeting of the Republican State convention at Harrisburg, Wednesday, April 29th. The ticket to be nominated is one person for the office of judge of the superior court; 34 persons, two at large for presidential electors, and to elect four delegates and four alternates at large to the Republican national convention to be held in Chicago on June 16.

In the House of Representatives, yesterday, Mr. Acheson, of Pennsylvania, introduced a bill "forbidding the mailing of newspapers or other publications containing a liquor advertisement, and fixing as the penalty for violation a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than one year, or both."

THE Kansas legislature passed a concurrent resolution endorsing Taft last Tuesday without a dissenting voice. The resolution described the big Secretary as "a statesman of world-wide experience, who believes in the pristine virtues and lofty ideals of the early days of the republic, a tried, true and capable citizen, whose first and last thought is administration of the people's government in behalf of all the people."

In urging the Democratic members of the Legislature in Kentucky to elect Governor Beckham to the United States Senate Mr. Bryan declares that in 1904 he took his medicine in Parker, whom he didn't want, and that he did what he could for him.

The announcement to the effect that the Hon. Joseph Sibble has decided to quit politics will set at rest a large amount of talk that has been going on in this congressional district for some time.

Mr. Wheeler has not come to the front as a man who desires to set the world on fire, but his conservative business methods have won for him the respect and good will of his constituents as well as of his co-workers in the national body.

Mr. Sibble is to go abroad to visit the scenes in the Holy Land. He will take a rest which he has for some years felt himself entitled to.

Neighborhood Notes. The Erie-Jury in the case of William Barthelmas vs. the Lake Shore Railroad company, has returned a verdict for damages in the sum of \$4,125.

Three Franklin boys and one Oil City boy, charged with robbery, agreed with District Attorney Dan B. Goodwin of Venango county to plead guilty to the charge and save the county the expense of a trial. When arraigned Monday two of the lads refused. They were remanded to jail and will stand trial.

Captain Fred C. Peck, an ex-sheriff of Crawford county, and late clerk in the pension department died at his home in Washington, D. C., Friday Jan. 24, aged 65 years. Captain Peck was born and raised in Crawford county, and has many friends at his old home. He was a brother of George Peck of Grand Valley.

"I put the rope around her neck and when she ordered it removed I did not do so, and she made a leap which ended her life. It was horrible." These were revelations in a confession John Fetter, 73 years old, a retired hotel keeper of South Bethlehem, gasped out to Justice of the Peace F. Hans Friday as he lay in bed close to death's door. The secret which has tortured his soul for thirteen years was the murder of his daughter Ellen in November, 1894. She kept house for her father, and one day she was found dead, hanging by a rope from the banister in the Fetter home. Her father said he found her there and that she had hanged herself, as she often said she would. There was considerable talk of foul play, but the coroner based his verdict upon the father's statement and there was no inquest.

Captain Clapp's Will. A decided setback was given to the case of Mrs. Robert C. Hall, formerly Miss Frances Pearson Clapp, and her brother and sister, in Washington, D. C., last week, in their effort to break the will of their father, Captain John M. Clapp, the millionaire oil operator. A jury in the Probate Court rendered a verdict that Captain Clapp, who died at Lakewood, N. Y., October 16, 1906, was legally domiciled in the District of Columbia. The will provides that the estate, valued at more than \$2,000,000, shall be equally divided among the three children, but a large portion of the principal is to be held in trust. It is to break this provision that suit was brought. An effort was made to have New York declared Captain Clapp's legal residence. A provision of trust is not binding under the New York law. Mrs. Robert C. Hall and her co-heirs would each receive nearly \$700,000 if their father was declared to have been a legal resident of New York, as it is said the property could be immediately partitioned. C. C. Lee, attorney for Mrs. Hall, in Pittsburgh, said that steps would be taken to appeal the case. He intimated that the fight had only been begun. The claim of the heirs to have New York declared Captain Clapp's legal residence is based on the fact that he had a summer home there. He spent the last months of his life and died at Lakewood.
