Mary Stanton Collins, daughter of Danjel and Lydia Chadwick Stanton, was born in Shippen, McKean county, Pa., February 10, 1836, and died at her home Nebraska, Pa., October 18, 1908, aged 7: years, 8 months and 8 days. In early childhood her parents moved to the State of Iowa and located in Mt. Pleasant, Here they remained for several years when they returned to this State locating in Rockland, Venango county, Pa., where she spent her early childhood, Possessing a mind of more than ordinary ability she thoroughly fitted herself to teach school, and in this vocation was most successful, and for some time was teacher of a private school for young women in the city of Franklin. It was while teaching school in Hickory township that she became acquainted with her future husband, Mr. Truman D. Collins. On April 26, 1864, they were united in narriage and at once began keeping house in Beaver Valley, where her husband was then extensively engaged in lumbering. Mrs. Collins was greatly devoted to her home and here she was a queen judeed.
