This is a mighty good year for Republicans to vote their ticket straight, and from all appearances there's a mighty lot of 'em going to vote that way.

Let no Republican be misled by requests for "complimentary" votes in the concluding hours of the campaign. The business of Republicans is to vote the straight ticket. Let the Democracy take care of its own battles.

The straw votes look so much like Taft that Parker is getting anxious about holding the record he landed four years ago. But Esopus is likely to retain the distinction of losing every Northern State. Bryan is reported to have some prospects in Nevada.

Be careful in marking your ballot next Tuesday, Republicans. In splitting your ticket there is great danger of losing your vote for Taft, as the ballot is a large and intricate one. Better make one cross opposite the name Republican and let it go at that. This is a good year in which to vote the straight ticket.

Even the most optimistic of the Democratic prophets will not go on record as giving Mr. Bryan more than the number of electors barely necessary to elect him. The campaign, so far as results are concerned, is over. Mr. Taft will win. It is only a question of majority, and every Republican should put his shoulder to the wheel and make the majority a rousing one.

When the 3d day of November is past it will be found that Hon. William E. Rice of Warren, the Republican nominee for President Judge of this district, will be the most unanimously elected candidate that has been before the people since the district was formed. He has the endorsement of every party in the district except the Prohibition. The people will have a righteous Judge who will grow in their estimation as his term of office advances.

Under your Republican neighbor, who may have an indifferent streak on, to get out and vote and do a little hustling for the ticket. The election comes next Tuesday, and in order that the old-fashioned majority be rolled up for the whole ticket it is necessary to be stirring. The great heart of the country is with Taft and Sherman, and they should have the support of every loyal Republican, which means the triumphant election of the entire excellent ticket.

From every portion of the 28th district comes the pleasing assurance that our able and popular Congressman, Nelson P. Wheeler, is going to have a rousing majority. The people like a clean, courageous, incorruptible representative, and they feel that in the present member they have such an one, and are going to give him a big vote of confidence in this campaign. Let little Froese lead all the rest in this endorsement of her favorite son. Make Mr. Wheeler's majority unanimous.

With Harrison and Zuendel in the Commissioners' office the affairs of the county will be carefully, economically and conscientiously administered. Both are men of level heads, honest and faithful in the discharge of official duty, and will look well to the interests of the taxpayers of the county. We predict that their administration will be one of the most satisfactory the county has had in many years. Give these two stalwart Republicans and farmers your vote and hearty support.

To ATTRACT votes, silent voters, Mr. Bryan is circulating two political documents of a strictly personal nature. One is the "Prince of Peace" sermon, which is mailed to members of all denominations. It is expected to do effective work among the religious and benevolent, to whom it is a bid to support Mr. Bryan as a truly virtuous man of lofty ideals and altruistic purposes—the good man who could do no wrong. The other document is an account of Mr. Bryan's visit to the Vatican, in which he gives an appreciative and pleasing picture of Pius X. This is sent only to Catholic voters. There is no reason why any one should not resent Mr. Bryan's unctuous solicitations to vote for him for reasons of religion. They will react upon him, for the American people hate a humbug.

Don't Spoil Your Ballot.

Four years ago a large number of votes were lost to the local candidates on account of the voters marking in the square at the top of the column containing the names of the Presidential electors, believing that he was voting for the whole ticket, whereas the ballot counted for the electors only. When that is done it is necessary to make a cross opposite the name of each of the other candidates for whom you desire to vote. To vote the straight ticket a cross in the square opposite the name of the party on the extreme left of the ballot, is all that is required. For instance: The first column on the ballot is composed of the party names, beginning with the Republican party. To vote a straight Republican ticket, then it is only necessary to make your cross in the square attached to that party. When you have done this do not mark anywhere else as by so doing you are liable to lose your vote for the Republican Presidential candidate. Be careful in voting, thus avoiding mistakes that may invalidate your entire ballot.

FOREST COUNTY never had a more careful painstaking efficient and obliging official than J. C. Geist, the nominee of the Republican party for Prothonotary. Hundreds of people who have had occasion to do business at his office will cheerfully testify to the truth of this assertion. No man ever went to the Prothonotary's office to transact business that did not come away with a higher regard for Mr. Geist than when he went there, and this without regard to his political affiliations. Every one receives the most courteous attention. A vote for Mr. Geist is a vote directly for your own interest. Remember this on election day.

A VOTE for Sharp Maxwell, is a vote to place in the Sheriff's office an honest laboring man, who has earned his living and reared his family by hard toil; has discharged every honest obligation and stands today as one of Forest county's most upright and highly respected citizens. Sharp will make a splendid official, having a cool, clear head, a good education and plenty of nerve. And with all this he is a good, loyal Republican, and having been fairly nominated by that party he deserves, and we believe will receive, the vote of every member of his party. Mr. Maxwell's Democratic opponents are busily circulating the falsehood that he became a Republican in order to get office, and then argue that Republicans ought to vote the Democratic ticket. The fact of the matter is that Sharp voted for President McKinley twelve years ago, and thousands of Democrats did likewise, and from that day to the present he has been a staunch Republican, and at the approaching election his vote will be for Taft and prosperity as against Bryan and ruin, and that ought to be enough to squelch any canard that he is not a sound, loyal Republican. Stand by him and help to swell his majority.

Last Warning to Republican Voters of Forest County. As Chairman of the Republican Committee, I deem it incumbent to call the attention of the Republican voters of the several election precincts of this County, as to their duties Tuesday, November 3d. The highest, most responsible and patriotic duty that devolves upon an American citizen is the exercise of his sovereign power at the ballot box; they then elect law-makers and executive officers, and hence are responsible for the manner of their execution. The question is, shall we support the principles and policies of the Republican party that have given this country such a large measure of prosperity and happiness, or shall we try the shifting and unstable vagaries of Bryanism, which are so closely allied with Socialism?

The national tickets are Taft and Bryan. The daily press has fully set forth to the American people the qualifications of each as leaders of the two great parties. The editor of this paper has frequently stated the qualifications of each and every Republican candidate of this County, which are not now necessary to repeat. However, I have advised the following, which appeared in the FOREST REPUBLICAN, October 21st; to reappear in this article: "Vote for Taft, Sherman, Porter, Wheeler, Rice Mechling, Geist, Maxwell, Harrison, Zuendel, Gregg, Warden and Sibble. One cross will do the job."

I will further say that when you go in to the booth to mark your ballot it will be dangerous for you to make a cross opposite some candidate's name not a Republican, as you may lose the entire ballot, or in other words your ballot may be thrown out, and not one candidate will receive your support. In conclusion, I further wish to call the attention of the Republican voters to what was done in this County two years ago in regard to Assembly. I find that statistics show that this county gave a Republican majority of 401 for Governor, and the same election reports show that the Democratic candidate for Assembly received 23 more votes than the Republican candidate for Assembly.

Will this be repeated in regard to the Assembly Nov. 3d, 1908? I beg leave to say, from reliable reports that I have received that the Republican voters of this county will redeem what was lost two years ago. And for your further information I wish to call your attention to the fact that in 1909 the members of the House of Representatives and Senate will elect a United States Senator. Think this matter over carefully if you have any intention of splitting your ballot. Don't do so.

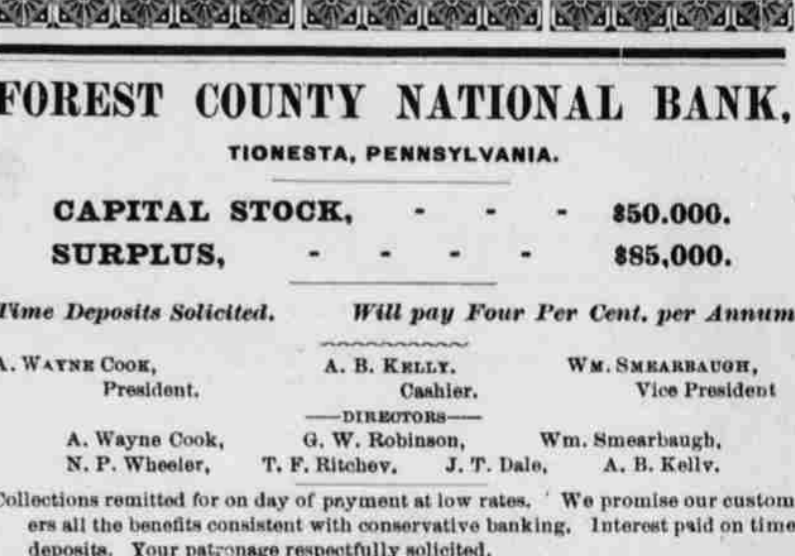
