

State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or commis-sioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercis-ing at the time, the office or appoint-ment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no impector, judge or other officer of such election shall be cligible to be then voted for.

The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall representatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at the Prothonotary's office in the Borough of Tionesta, as follows: "All udges living within twelve miles of the Prothonotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village, or city upon the line of a railroad leading to the county seat, shall before 2 o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, November 4th, 1908, and all other Judges

shall, before 12 o'clock m., on THURS-DAY, November 5th, 1908, deliver said returns, together with the return sheets, to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common reas of Forest County, which said re-turn shall be filed, and the day and hour of filing marked therein, and shall be preserved by the Frothonotary for pub-lie inspection.




