The Late Legislature.

The legislature of Pennsylvania adjourned at noon on Thursday last, after one of the shortest and most business like sessions in the history of the state. While lew bills of an important nature were passed, the work being mainly confined to the enacting of the necessary appropriation bills, there are a number which are designed, and ought to, inure to the benefit of the people in a large degree. One of these is the new school code, on which a great fight was made, and while the measure underwent many changes from the form in which it came from the commission that drafted it, friends of education believe it will revolutionize, for good, the common school system of the state and prove a great stride in the direction of improvement over the present laws. A test alone will determine this point, and that test should be thorough before it is condemned. Good roads legislation received much consideration by this legislature, and the state's revenues were lavishly given for this purpose. The Carothers bill, carrying four million for macadamized roads, was passed, as was also the Jones bill, which appropriates one million to belp the townships that adopt the all cash tax system for road purposes. The state highway bill, carrying a \$3,000,000 appropriation, was perhaps the least popular road bill to pass, but the counties through which the road will pass were enthusiastic in its support and mustered up sufficient support to carry it through, with the backing of the Governor. It will be years before this road will be completed, but it will be a beautiful boulevard when tinished.
