THE United States pension roll is now at the lowest notch it has occupied for the past 16 years. The forthcoming report of Commissioner Warner will show that there are now 947,708 beneficiaries of the federal pension system. This is the smallest number reported at any time since 1893. A couple of years ago the pension roll reached the 1,000,000 mark. It remained there for a brief period of time only, as deaths resulting from old age quickly reduced it. The pension authorities believe that the list will sbrink rapidly from now on, unless congress broadens the pension field by new legislation. During the month of May there were 4,133 deaths among the pensioners. During the same month, 2,936 names were added to the list.
