The Teachers' Institute. The forty-third annual session of the

Forest County 'Teachers' Institute was called to order Monday afternoon at 1:30. by County Superintendent D. W. Morrison. The enrollment showed eighty-six teachers present and seven being absent. An organization was effected by the election of the following officers: President, D. W. Morrison; vice president, F. W. Gill; secretary, Miss Blanche Pease; planist, Miss Goldia Hill; executive committee, W. E. Page, J. L. Simmons, C. F. Feit, Orion Allio,

After devotional exercises Dr. O. L. Warren, of Elmira, N. Y., who was formerly supervising principal of the training school of that city, was introduced to the trachers of Forest county, and spoke on the subject of "The Ideal Teacher." Dr. Warren showed the characteristics of an educator and painted the ideal teacher in a manner both pleasing and profitable, inspiring the teachers to instill the motives into the children who are intrusted to their care which will make for better citizens and honest men and women. Dr. Warren has the co-operation of every teacher in the institute and will be a valuable instructor for the coming week. The second speaker of the afternoor session was Dr. J. 


