isions of the new Constitution of Penn-ARTICLE VIII. SUFFRAGE AND ELECTION.
Sec. 1. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections:

First-He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

Second—He shall have resided in the
State one year, (or, if having previously
been a qualified elector or native born
citizen of the State he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six onths,) immediately preceding the elec-Third-He shall have resided in the

election district where he offers to vote ng the election. Fourth-If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two month and paid at least one month before ele Sec. 2. The general election shall be

held annually on the Tuesday next fol-lowing the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, ax a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each house consenting there-


The Electors of Jenks township resid- or this State, or any city or incorporated district whether commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State, or in any city, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or commis-sioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of helding or exercis-ing at the time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be ther

voted for The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall representatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at the Prothonotary's office in the Borough of Tionesia, as follows: "All judges living within twelve miles of the Prothonotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village, or city upon the line of a railroad leading to the county seat, shall before 2 o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, November 3d, 1909, and all other Judges sball, before 12 o'clock m., on THURS-DAY, November 4th, 1909, deliver said returns, together with the return sheets, to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of Forest County, which said return shall be filed, and the day and hour of filing marked therein, and shall be preserved by the Prothonotary for pub-
