PACKERS INDICTED

Filing of Suit Seeking Dissolution of National Packing Co.

Chicago, March 22. — Indictments were returned against the National Packing company and the subsidiary concerns by the federal grand jury which has been investigating for the last three months alleged violations of the Sherman anti-trust law. The indictments were returned before Judge Kenesaw Landis, The National Packing company and the following concerns, all branches of the National Packing company, were indicted: C. H. Hammond Co., Michigan; Anglo-American Provision Co., Illinois; Omaha Packing Co., Illinois; Fowler Packing Co., United Dressed Beef Co., New York; St. Louis Dressed Beef and Provision Co., Western Packing Co., Denver; Colorado Packing and Provision Co., Denver; New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Co., New York; Hammond Packing Co., Illinois.

Simultaneously with the announcement of the indictments came the filing of a suit by the government seeking the dissolution of the National Packing company. The action is known as a suit in equity and is believed to mark the beginning of the end of any open combination of the packers under the guise of a single company.

While none of the packers was named in the indictment they are mentioned in the suit in equity. Those who are made defendants to the suit in equity besides those corporations which were indicted are: Armour & Co., Swift & Co., Edward Ogden, Louis F. Swift, Edward F. Swift, Charles H. Swift, L. A. Carlton, Frank A. Fowler, J. Ogden Armour, Arthur Meeker, Thomas J. Connors, Edward Morris, Thomas E. Wilson, L. H. Heyman and Continental Packing company.

A RUSSIAN PRISONER.

Experience of a Man Who Was Chained to a Wheelbarrow.

In writing of the Schlussemburg prison in McClure's Magazine David Soudice tells of a prisoner who was chained to a wheelbarrow: "Schedrin had been condemned to hard labor in the convict mines of Siberia and for an attempt to escape from there had been sentenced to be chained to a heavy wheelbarrow. When the order came for his transfer from Siberia to St. Petersburg no conveyance could be found large enough to contain him, the wheelbarrow and the convoy of gendarmes. Yet, as the wheelbarrow had become a part of the prisoner, the gendarmes were afraid to leave it behind. It was therefore decided to place Schedrin with his conveyance in one cart and the wheelbarrow behind in another. For several months, day and night, Schedrin and the gendarmes galloped through Siberia upon a troika in three horses and sledges, while another sledge behind them upon which the wheelbarrow reposed, causing the deepest amazement among the peasants in the villages through which they passed. Upon the arrival of the prisoner in St. Peter and Paul he was once again chained to the barrow, and only after he had been six weeks in the Schlussemburg was he finally detached from it and given freedom of movement within the narrow confines of his cell.

"When they unchained me," said Schedrin subsequently, "I could not get enough movement. I wanted to run and run, and it seemed to me that I could never stop. How strange it is that men who can enjoy perfect freedom of movement never realize the wonderful happiness that is theirs."
