About 500 acres, heavily timbered with hemlock and various bardwoods, are involved. The value of the property in dispute is said to exceed \$100,000. The case was tried before Judge Frank J. Thomas, of Crawford county, in the Forest county court, in September, 1907, when a verdict for the defendants was given. An applieation for a new trial was made and refused. The case was then appealed and sheep argued before the Supreme Court in Pittsburg in October, 1908, which reversed the decision of the lower court and sent the
