RISKS HER LIFE FOR HORSE

Chester, Pa., Sept. 27.—Miss Mary Bentley, sister of Dr. George R. Bentley, of this city, saved her brother's horse from injury by jumping on its neck after it had fallen in an effort to run away.

She was thrown about by the fractious equine, but held him until her brother arrived. Miss Bentley was only slightly injured, but the road cart to which the horse was hitched was wrecked.

Bartlesville, Okla., Sept. 27.—Anne Buffalo, an Indian maiden, shot and killed her sweetheart, Jacob Moore, a white man, here last night. She drove in a cab to a house where Moore was visiting friends and, calling him to the door, shot him. Jealousy was the cause.

GREAT GAS WELL STRUCK

One of the Largest Ever Found in Western New York Field.

The Standard Oil company, while drilling for gas on Walnut creek in the town of Ariwight, N. Y., struck the greatest flow of gas ever known in the Western New York gas field.

The well was capped and metered and found to be flowing 500,000 feet of gas per day. The well is down 2,600 feet and had only penetrated twelve inches into Medina sandstone when the rush of gas came up with such force as to cut the cable that held the drill and the roaring could be heard a mile away.
