### CEMENT STATISTICS

33,500,000 Gain In Investments Over Previous Year.

Harrisburg, Oct. 18.-The extent of the cement industry in Pensylvania is dealt with by Chief John L. Rockley of the state bureau of industrial statistics, in a report just issued.

In 1969 the investment in 23 plants in this state was \$44,031,955, an increase of \$3,500,000 over the previous year. The value of the production was \$15,962,210, a gain of a million over 1908, while the output was 19,-592,335 barrels, against 17.831,195 in

The industry employed 9,540 perons to whom were paid \$4,687,807, an increase over 1908, when the wages paid reached \$3,823,725. American employes number 3,598. Office help numbered 516, receiving \$601,949. The industry reported 458 accidents, of which 23 were fatal.

Lives Lost In Second Hurricane. Havana, Oct. 18 .- A secondary hurricane, much more violent than the one of last week, struck Havana and since that time has been steadily increasing in intensity. Scores of small craft, lighters and schooners, have been sunk in the harbor and others are in serious danger. The number of persons drowned is not known.

The attorney for the second assistant postmaster general of the United States has ruled that in the future no "dunning" postal cards shall be sent through the mails by public service corporations and delinquent tax collectors.

The word "dunning" is defined to cover any postal card that refers directly or indirectly to any bill owing to the sender or Sheriff. 




